
The weekend provides an opportunity for people across the Borough to come together to celebrate the historic milestone and we'll also be hosting a number of community events.

On the evening of Thursday 2nd June, we'll be lighting our coastal beacons at Seaton Carew and the Headland at 9pm. The Jubilee Beacons will provide an opportunity for communities and people throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man, UK Overseas Territories and the Commonwealth to come together to celebrate this historic milestone.

On the evening of Saturday 4th June, we'll be live streaming the Platinum Party at the Palace at Elephant Rock - the restored outdoor events space on Hartlepool's Headland.

As Hartbeat went to print, the exact details had not been confirmed, but the BBC is promising an event featuring an incredible range of highlights from global music stars with a full, live orchestra - to actors from film, TV and the stage telling the story and celebrating some of the most significant cultural moments from The Queen's reign.

Then on Sunday 5th June, the team behind Hartlepool Waterfront Festival has invited artists from across Europe to take over the historic Headland – with the Headland Squircle and Elephant Rock being the two main pitches.

Pull up a deck chair and get settled in for an afternoon of some of the most dazzling performances the Headland has ever seen!

As well as our main programme of activity, Redheugh Gardens will play host to a sound garden by local musician Madeleine Smyth, who has taken local memories of the Queen and her reign and sounds from across our country and woven them into an audible tapestry that will be played throughout the day.

Remembering Hartlepool's royal celebrations

There will be a fascinating look back at how Hartlepool celebrated royal events during The Queen's reign in a special Platinum Jubilee exhibition at Community Hub Central.

Called 'I Remember', the free exhibition will run from Monday 30th May to Friday 24th June and will feature photographs, newspaper cuttings, memorabilia and personal reminiscences, including contributions from local residents.

Among the occasions in the spotlight will be the 1953 Coronation – when Hartlepool celebrated with parades and street parties – the 1977 Silver Jubilee, when the Queen visited the town, and later events including The Queen's 1993 visit to open the Marina and Princess Anne's 1970 visit to open Middleton Grange Shopping Centre.

Jamie Kelly, Hartlepool Borough Council's Community Hubs Manager, said: "The exhibition will be a nostalgic trip down memory lane for those who lived through these remarkable

events and an interesting experience for our younger residents.

"It also gives a fascinating insight into how things have changed over the past 70 years – when The Queen began her reign the average house price was £1,890 – equal to £38,800 in today's prices – and a pint of beer was one shilling and three pence!"

Street parties

The UK has a long history of organised street parties to celebrate national events and we're delighted many residents across Hartlepool are joining together to celebrate this historic milestone.

As a local authority, we are facilitating any necessary road closures and have waived the usual charge for the provision of the traffic management equipment.

Constituted neighbourhood or community groups were also invited to apply for a grant of between £50 and £250 to cover the costs of their activity and Hartlepool Borough Council has allocated funding to 29 groups.

Across the Bank Holiday weekend, residents are encouraged to share photos on social media using the hashtags #PlatinumJubileeHartlepool and #HM70Hartlepool.

Work completed on new Summerhill cycle track

The construction of a new 750-metre cycling track at Summerhill Country Park has been completed.

It has been designed to provide accessible, traffic-free community cycling facilities and opportunities for people of all ages and cycling abilities.

The "free-form" tarmac track is fenced and floodlit and built on gently sloping terrain. It incorporates varying elevations and degrees of cornering difficulty.

Two secure cycle storage containers have also been installed on site.

In addition, a dedicated balance bike and learnto-ride area is being created on the grassed area to the side of the Summerhill Visitors Centre for younger people to learn new skills.

The project has been made possible by funding from British Cycling and Hartlepool Borough Council.

Construction work, which started in February, has been carried out by Rainton Construction Ltd.

Daniel Garthwaite, Hartlepool Borough Council's Participation and Strategy Manager, said: "We are delighted with the track, it looks great.

"It is a great asset for the town and, in particular, will enable young people, families, disabled people and women to cycle more safely, more often."

The track is now available for use by local cycling clubs. Testing of its accessibility will continue through June and it is expected to open for general use in July. An official opening is expected to take place later in the summer on a date to be confirmed.

A programme of activity for the track, including club sessions and "open" recreational cycling, will be publicised online where people will be able to find out more about how to book and pricing.

Significant milestone in development of Highlight



Work to carry out essential repairs and maintenance to the dock walls surrounding the site earmarked for Highlight has now been completed.

Specialist marine civil engineering company Sealane Inshore spent several weeks filling in holes in the walls, replacing bricks and regrouting joints.

Divers worked in depths of up to 25ft to carry out the repairs and maintenance, using between 10 and 20 tonnes of concrete.

Kieran Bostock, Hartlepool Borough Council's Assistant Director (Place Management), said: "These works are a significant milestone in the on-going development of Highlight as they are the first to be carried out on The Waterfront site.

"They are a vital part of ensuring that the site is ready for construction work to begin in due course."

The completion of the work coincides with the release of a new computer generated image of how Highlight will look.

The building has been designed by GT3 Architects, its shape inspired by the railway tracks which ran from local timber and coal yards into the former dockland site during the 19th and early 20th centuries.

The development is following the RIBA (Royal Institute of British Architects) Plan of Work which essentially organises the process of a building project into eight stages (0-7), from initial briefing right the way through to operation. Highlight is currently at the end of Stage 4, the technical design stage.

An application for planning permission for Highlight has been submitted. Following its determination by the Council's Planning Committee, the process to procure a main contractor will begin.

Catherine Honey, Hartlepool Borough Council's Event Director Tall Ships 2023, said "This will be a life-changing experience for five young people to be part of a crew taking part in the 2022 race from Belgium to Denmark.

"We will allocate our five trainees to an English speaking ship and they'll get to experience life onboard and take part in all of the daily tasks. "We want to be able to tell their story and we will work with the Northern School of Art and media partners to do this in creating a documentary series.

"Our five sail trainees will also become ambassadors for us and help us to promote The Tall Ships Races 2023.

"The Tall Ships Races are far more than a fantastic festival with spectacular vessels, music and entertainment.

"At the heart of the event is the life-changing opportunity offered to young people, strengthening their skills and competencies through sail training."

STAY SAFE AT THE **SEASIDE**

If you're heading to Hartlepool's beaches this summer for a fun-filled family day out, we've got some important tips to help you stay safe.

Hartlepool Borough Council's beach lifeguards will be patrolling the beach at Seaton Carew and the Headland's Block Sands throughout the school summer holiday period.

They will be on duty every day from 23rd July to 4th September and they're asking everyone to follow these simple safeguards:

- Follow any safety advice which the lifeguards give and take note of any beach safety signs.
- Swim where the lifeguards patrol within the areas marked by the red and yellow marker flags.
- Never go into the water when the red flags are flying – it means it's not safe to do so.
- Be aware of incoming tides.

Seaton Carew's golden, sandy beach has once again earned this top award and I'd like to thank the Council staff and volunteers who work so hard to keep it looking so good.

"With its lovely beach, its family leisure area on the prom and its seafront gift shops, amusements and eateries, Seaton Carew offers a great day out for all the family, right on the doorstep."

- Don't use inflatables in the sea the tides, currents and wind can easily carry you far away from the shore.
- Waves are very powerful avoid piers, slipways and promenades when the sea conditions are rough.
- Beware of rip currents strong currents running out to sea which can take swimmers out of their depth very easily.
- Think before you dive be very careful when diving at any time and never dive into water with which you are not familiar – there may be hidden dangers such as rocks, currents or insufficient depth.
- Never swim on your own you should have someone on hand in case you get into difficulty.
- If you get into difficulty, float on your back, wait until you are calm then raise your arm and shout for help.
- If you see someone in difficulty in the sea, don't enter the water – summon a lifeguard or call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

Have a happy and safe day at the seaside!

The Health and Care Academy is a partnership between North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Foundation Trust and Hartlepool College of Further Education, while the Civil Engineering Academy is a partnership between the college and Seymour Civil Engineering.

Little terns return to nesting site

Visitors to a Hartlepool beach are being urged to respect a colony of rare seabirds and avoid disturbing their nests.

The little terns have again taken up residence on a stretch of beach at Seaton Carew after nesting there for the first time in 2019. The nesting area is close to the resort's centre, behind the bus station

Weighing only 40-60g and about the size of a starling, little terns are the smallest of the five species of terns that breed in the UK. The birds lay their well-camouflaged eggs in shallow scrapes in the sand, but this makes the nests very difficult to spot and leaves them extremely vulnerable to disturbance and damage.

This year, a more substantial fence has been put up to try to protect their nests and wardens from the Durham Wildlife Trust are monitoring the site as part of the National Lottery Heritage Fund SeaScapes Partnership.

Senior warden Mandy Bell said: "The little terns have come all the way from West Africa to actually nest on this beach - what a privilege!

"I do not know of another nesting site that is as close to the promenade, but this does make them vulnerable to disturbance. Over the last few years we have had problems with people and dogs getting onto the site.

Sarah Scarr, Hartlepool Borough Council's Heritage and Countryside Manager, said: "We would ask people to respect the site and keep their distance. Adult birds will leave their nests if disturbed, leaving their eggs and chicks vulnerable to the weather and predators."

"Please remember that COVID is still out there, so please continue stay vigilant and take care, to help protect yourself and others."

SAVE THE DATE FOR THIS YEAR'S



The dates have been announced for this year's flagship summer event in Hartlepool.

Hartlepool Waterfront Festival, organised by Hartlepool Borough Council, will be on Saturday 9th and Sunday 10th July from midday to 6pm and looks set to be bigger and better than ever before.


Now in its fifth year, this outdoor celebration of creativity draws thousands of local, regional and national visitors to Hartlepool.

It will take place on The Waterfront in the heart of Hartlepool Marina and will feature a jampacked programme of open-air performances, immersive experiences, family-friendly activities and creative installations.

After scaling back the activity workshops element of the festival last year due to COVID, the workshops – which are enjoyed by thousands of children and young people – are making a welcome return. The festival - which takes place almost exactly one year before the Tall Ships return to Hartlepool - will be themed 'When The Boat Comes in', exploring the ideas of arrivals, departures, welcomes and goodbyes.

It will be the last Waterfront Festival on the Waterfront before the forthcoming construction of the multi-million pound leisure facility Highlight on the site.

Among the festival attractions confirmed so far is Gaia - a spectacular replica of planet Earth by internationally-renowned visual artist Luke Jerram which will be coming to Hartlepool Town Hall Theatre, giving visitors the chance to gaze upon the Earth as if from space.



Luke exhibited at last year's Waterfront Festival, at a site in Seaton Park, and most recently in Durham Cathedral with Museum of the Moon.

Also on the bill will be performance group Folk Dance Remixed, with the most extravagant ceilidh you've ever witnessed!



The festival will also be welcoming Headland artist Stuart Langley's three highly distinctive stained glass Reliant Robin artworks, which feature iconic images of Durham Cathedral and the Angel of the North and explore what 'home' has meant for the wider North-East.

Further 'moments of artistic joy' will also be popping up around town throughout the month of July, including Murmurations by Tangled



Feet Theatre at North Gare. Murmurations is a guided tour into nature which you'll never forget. Through live scenes and songs, poetry and physical theatre, comedy and tragedy, Murmurations explores what we need from nature and what nature needs from us in a world healing from sickness.

Ian Gardiner, Hartlepool Borough Council's Head of Service - Active and Creative Hartlepool, said: "We're really excited about this year's Waterfront Festival and are really looking forward to welcoming people in July.

"Our proximity to the sea has shaped who we are and we can't wait to explore what it means to live here in Hartlepool through this year's theme.

"We're also looking forward to hosting Gaia – it's sure to be an amazing experience."

This year's Hartlepool Waterfront Festival will be unticketed and will once again be Pay What You Decide. Visitors will be able to make anonymous donations based on their experience of the event and the money will go towards commissioning additional children's activities at next year's festival.

Major step forward for station improvements

The transformation of Hartlepool railway station has reached another milestone with plans for the redevelopment being submitted to Hartlepool **Borough Council.**

Subject to planning approval, work on the project - which is supported by the Council, Network Rail, Grand Central and Northern Trains - will begin later this summer and be completed in time for the return of the Tall Ships to Hartlepool in July 2023.

The scheme – which has been made possible thanks to £12m secured by Tees Valley Mayor Ben Houchen from the Government - will see the station's redundant second platform brought back into use, opening up capacity and unlocking the potential for future growth in services, and the installation of new lifts and a footbridge to provide access to the platform.

Hartlepool station is the busiest single-platform station in the UK and the third largest station in the region. The improvements will make it easier to use, better connected and ready to respond to Hartlepool's future growth.

Council awards success

Elephant Rock

Elephant Rock, the restored outdoor events space on Hartlepool's historic Headland, has been named the Best Small Project in the Small Category of the ICE (Institution of Civil Engineers) North East awards which aims to promote and celebrate civil engineering across the region.

The site has also been shortlisted for two further awards in the Constructing Excellence in the North East awards, in the categories Value and Conservation and Regeneration.

Located on the promenade next to the Heugh Battery Museum, Elephant Rock has been developed by Hartlepool Borough Council. It was designed by the authority's own in-house teams and local company Seymour Civil Engineering carried out the work on the ground as Principal Contractor.

TAKE THE CHALLENGE!

Entries are being taken for Hartlepool's third Big Lime Weekend which will take place from Friday 12th August-Sunday 14th August.

The events - a predictor swim, an aquathlon and a triathlon - are open to competitors of all abilities.

Organiser Hartlepool Borough Council is also keen to recruit more volunteer marshals to help events run smoothly. Marshals, who should be aged 16+, are stationed at points around the course to support both competitors and spectators.

Ahead of the weekend, the Council will be working with British Triathlon, local triathlon clubs and Hartlepool Marina to hold open water swimming training sessions. These will be publicised once confirmed.

Competitors embracing the Triple Lime Challenge by entering all three races over the weekend will receive the Friday predictor swim for free.

Regional energy awards

Hartlepool Borough Council has held on to the title of Council of the Year at the North East Regional Energy

The Council, working with four ECO contractors and the appointed contractor for the Warm Homes Fund has improved 566 homes by installing the following energy efficiency measures: 444 gas boilers, 320 cavity wall insulations, 25 loft insulations, 42 underfloor insulations, 14 party wall insulations, 3 first-time central heating installations, 122 heating controls, 28 air source heat pumps and 16 gas central heating installations. It is estimated these measures represent lifetime savings to residents of £6,894,059.

Tony Hanson, Hartlepool Borough Council Director for Neighbourhoods and Regulatory Services, said: "Winning and being recognised in these awards is a fantastic achievement and is a testament to the hard work and dedication of all those involved."

Young people in Hartlepool have a new face to represent them with the election of Georgia Robson as the town's Member of the UK Youth Parliament.

The 16-year-old, who is studying English and history at Manor Community Academy and aims to become a forensic psychologist, will serve for two years, working with youth groups, councillors and other decision-makers on the issues which matter to young people aged 11-18.

"I am very proud to have been elected and I'll be doing everything possible to make the voices of young people in Hartlepool heard," said Georgia, who has identified three key areas for particular focus.

Foremost, she wants to improve the mental health support available to students at school or college.

She said: "I struggled with my own mental health during COVID, missing loved ones and friends and feeling anxious and isolated, so I know first-hand just what an important issue this is for young people."

Georgia has launched a consultation on young people's mental health, seeking the views and experiences of 11-18-year-olds in the Borough.





New home for Throston Library

A new chapter has begun for Throston Library, which has reopened at its new location in Throston Youth Centre in Wiltshire Way.

The move – from its previous premises in Glamorgan Grove – maintains library provision in the Throston area when it would otherwise have been at risk in the longer term.

The library closed at its previous premises in March 2020 in response to the COVID pandemic. With statutory services subsequently delivering provision in the building and with budget pressures, the library had not been able to reopen.

In addition, a survey had indicated that almost a quarter of a million pounds was needed to bring the ageing building up to standard – expenditure which could not be met within Hartlepool Borough Council's existing budgets. As a result the library has relocated to Throston Youth Centre.
