RESPONDING TO COMMUNITY CONCERNS

I'M SICK OF OFF-ROAD BIKES.

As well as supporting Cleveland Police's efforts to crush and seize bikes, I funded a scheme to educate young people about the dangers of nuisance riding. My new app, COPA, will let you report the location of off-road bikes from your smart phone.

I'M CONCERNED ABOUT DRUG DEALING IN MY NEIGHBOURHOOD.

In a three month period, Cleveland Police made over 350 drug seizures, executed 18 drug warrants and disrupted a number of organised crime groups. Drug testing on arrest has been introduced to support and signpost people into treatment to reduce re-offending.

I'M FED UP WITH ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR.

I invested over £720,000 in services to help young people take part in meaningful activities and make more positive choices, to reduce the chance of them turning to crime or ASB
