116. Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Stephen Akers-Belcher, Sheila Griffin, John Lauderdale, Pat Rayner and David Young.

117. Declarations of interest by Members

Councillor Jonathan Brash declared a non-prejudicial interest in minutes 123, 124, 125 and 126. Councillor Mary Fleet declared a non-prejudicial interest in minute 124.

118. Minutes of the meetings held on 16th and 29th January, 27th February and 6th March 2007

Confirmed.

119. Matters Arising

Members requested an update on the Forum's report submitted to the Executive in relation to Eldon Grove Community Sports Centre. Although no formal response had been received, Members were informed that it was understood that it was the Executive's intention to retain the current service

provided at the Centre if at all possible. In light of this, a 3-month extension period to the proposed closure had been agreed by the Executive to enable any expressions of interest in continuing to provide this service to be made. The Scrutiny Support Officer indicated that a request for a formal response to be submitted to this Forum would be considered.

120. Responses from the Council, the Executive or Committees of the Council to Final Reports of this Forum

123. Fairness and Equity in Primary Care – Covering Report (Scrutiny Support Officer)

> The Scrutiny Support Officer advised Members that a representative from Hartlepool PCT had been invited to the meeting to discuss Fairness and Equity in Primary Care. Members were also reminded that a referral had recently been received from the South Neighbourhood Consultative Forum requesting that Primary Care provision across Hartlepool be examined, commencing with the Wy nyard Road Primary Care Centre.

> The representative from Hartlepool PCT presented a paper to the Forum which provided the background to the independent procurement of primary medical services which highlighted that Hartlepool was amongst the thirty most under doctored areas in the country. The main aim of the project was to provide a mechanism to make a significant impact on the inequalities in health experienced by Hartlepool people, whilst improving health outcomes and patient experience of primary medical services. As well as core services, the following specialist services would be included in the procurement:

- New GP practice providing substance misuse services
- Re-commissioning of existing PCTMS practice at Wynyard Road
- New GP practice preferably situated on the hospital site and within A&E also providing urgent care and OOH's provision.

Members sought clarification on the situation with the Wynyard Road Primary

Care Centre. The representative from the PCT indicated that the Centre was open and had always been open and the closure had been wrongly reported. How ever, the emergency care practitioner service had been withdraw n due to concerns with patient and practitioner safety. The provision of urgent care was currently part of a review which would form a strategy for the provision of urgent care, including a Rapid Response Team working alongside emergency practitioners across the whole community.

The representative from the PCT sought the views of Members on the comprehensiveness of the consultation being undertaken and questions posed within the document submitted to this meeting. The Chair responded that although the Forum had sight of the consultation paper in January 2007, Members were unclear exactly what they were being consulted on as the questions posed in the document tabled at today's meeting were not in the earlier paper. Members were of the understanding that the PCT had taken legal advice in relation to the consultation. The Forum had been advised by a representative from the Authority's Legal Division and this advice contradicted the advice given to the PCT. It was suggested that in light of similar issues raised during the consultation on the Reconfiguration of the PCTs, that a protocol for consultation be drawn up between the Local Authority and Hartlepool PCT. It was noted that Members of this Forum had been placed in a difficult position. They had the right to refer this matter to the Secretary of State. On a previous occasion, they had judged that it would not be in the interests of partnership working to make such a reference. How ever, given the repeated difference of opinion between their respective legal advisors, they felt bound to reserve their position on a possible reference to the Secretary of State until the PCT's response to the proposed protocol was know n. The representative from the PCT indicated that advice had been received from the Department of Health and acknow ledged that the PCT should consult and engage more fully. Furthermore, whilst accepting this, the representative from the PCT recognised the need to work in partnership with the Local Authority with the aim of providing better services for local people.

Members sought clarification of the Out of Hours and emergency care provision in Hartlepool. The representative from the PCT indicated that the proposed Centre at the old Barlow s building in Park Road was currently a work in progress with a view to providing primary care services, including four GPs, a huge range of services including minor theatre, gynaecology and urgent care from 8.00 am 6.00 pm initially. Although the PCT were not looking to expedite the proposed changes to the way emergency care was provided in Hartlepool, it was hoped that longer term planning would see the Centre opening for longer hours and possibly weekends.

Members had noted that it had been reported in the media that Hartlepool primary care provision would be part of a pilot scheme to include contracting of services to social enterprises and supermarkets. The representative from the PCT responded that expressions of interest had already been generated from some GPs and their partners to procure the provision of primary care services. In response to a question, the representative from the PCT indicated that there would be ambulance bays provided within the development at Park Road and that the Ambulance Trust was currently examining the possibility of locating ambulance bases in both the North and South of Hartlepool.

In relation to the proposed location of a primary care facility within the grounds of the University Hospital of Hartlepool, the representative from the PCT indicated that they were currently working with the Acute Trust to develop this proposal. Members questioned whether the provision of primary care services at this site was related with the withdrawal of consultant-led services at the Hospital. The representative from the PCT responded that these two issues were never part of the same discussions and that the changes to the Accident and Emergency services provided at the hospital were the part of the Tees Review. Members queried whether the provision of urgent care would be best provided within the centre of Hartlepool. The representative from the PCT stated that this would be examined in the fullness of time, but in the short term, this service would best be provided in a location that people were used to visiting for urgent care/emergency services.

Members sought clarification on the future of the primary care facility provided in Caroline Street. The representative responded that the premises in Caroline Street were currently undergoing refurbishment, but that this was mainly maintenance required to keep the Centre operational over the next 5-10 years. There was to be no huge investment in this building in the short term. How ever, the future of this site would be more certain, after the long-term future of the Hos pital was finalised.

The representative from the PCT was thanked for her attendance and for answ ering Members questions at which point she left the meeting.

Members were disappointed that the finalised consultation paper had been tabled at today's meeting and felt unable to provide a full response to the consultation at this stage. Members felt that ideally extended accident and emergency provision should be provided in the Town Centre. Members were concerned that the provision of a contract for 5-10 years, whilst awaiting the finalisation of the hospital proposals, would provide a sub-optimal service. It was suggested that Further information on the number of GPs and level of provision across Hartlepool would assist Members when forming their response to this consultation.

It was noted also that the Authority would need to examine the road layout and provision of access to the proposed site in Park Road and should work in conjunction with the PCT to co-ordinate a timetable for this. Members were also concerned about safeguarding jobs in Hartlepool as part of the contracting out arrangements for primary care services.

Decision

(i) That the Local Authority's legal division, in consultation with the PCT, urgently develop a protocol for consultation.

- That an initial response be made to Hartlepool PCT's Consultation:-(ii) That the Forum is pleased to receive proposals to increase the (a) numbers of GPs in Hartlepool how ever, the numbers proposed are small in comparison to media reports detailing what is required to bring Hartlepool up to the national standard.
 - That the services proposed are adequate: (b)

(c) In relation to the proposed location, that extended A&E Services should be located in the Town Centre. Rather than develop a suboptimal service it would be the Forums preference that the service is contracted and located where it is most needed (i.e. the town centre) from the outset.

(d) That the Executive ensures that discussions are being held around the Barlows Sites in relation to road layout to ensure that all systems are co-ordinated as necessary.

(e) That the PCT and NTH consider jointly the issue of Urgent Care in Hartlepool and develop a holistic plan; and,

(f) That in respect of providers, the PCT gives consideration to delivering services in partnership with local CVS organisations. (g) That the Forum reserves its position on a reference to the Secretary of State pending the PCT's response to the proposed protocol

124. Determining a Response – Foundation Trust Status **Consultation – North Tees and Hartle pool Trust** (Scrutiny Support Officer)

The Scrutiny Support Officer presented a report which outlined the consultation process that the North Tees and Hartlepool Trust were undertaking. Members will recall that the Chief Executive of the Trust was in attendance at the last meeting of this Forum and the key issues raised at this meeting were outlined below to aid Members determine their response.

- (a) The Trust is requesting the Adult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum to support its application for Foundation Status;
- (b) The Trust is consulting upon it's 'Vision for the Future' and its proposed governance arrangements for the Board of Governors and the Board of Directors:
- (c) That in respect of the Board, the Trust is able to modify the numbers involved but not the proportionality as this is pre-determined on population size;
- (d) That by becoming a Foundation Trust, North Tees and Hartlepool NHS

Trust will be able to become more responsive and flexible locally via the new ly acquired freedoms.

- (e) That North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust will remain a clinically led Trust and will not be driven by business-like objectives.
- (f) The viability of the health economy as a whole will remain a key concern for NTH;
- (g) That if a Foundation Trust becomes financially unstable and thereby unviable the situation in respect of future action remains the same as that of an Acute Trust. i.e. that staff will be made redundant and turn-around teams will be brought in to address the situation.
- (h) That North-Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust will seek to engage with the Neighbourhood Consultative Forums in Hartlepool;
- (i) That NTH will feedback results of the Consultation process to any groups that express an interest in receiving such information;
- (j) That the Trust's medium / long-term strategy for the future is in line with the Darzi Report and the subsequent direction from the Secretary of State;
- (k) In terms of reinvesting Capital Receipts accrued from the Sale of Land as a Foundation Trust, NTH confirmed that reinvestment would be made in line with the Trusts long-term strategy;
- (I) That NTH does not have any current plans to move services from Hartlepool Hospital if it is successful in its application to become a Foundation Trust;
- (m) North Tees and Hartlepool Trust own 70% of the Hartlepool Hospital site and have recently taken a decision to reclaim the remainder of the land from the Secretary of State.

At that meeting, it had been suggested that the Chief Executive of the Trust attend the three Neighbourhood Consultative Forums across the Town as part of the Trust's consultation process. Members were informed that the Communications Manager of the Trust had attended the Neighbourhood Forums earlier this week. However, it was noted that the content of the presentation and answering of questions had been disappointing with some of the responses needing to be referred to the Chief Executive of the Trust who did not attend.

The Scrutiny Support Officer informed Members that at the Joint Tees Valley Health Scrutiny Committee, Members had acknow ledged that whilst it was Government policy that all Trusts would be Foundation Trusts by 2008 they indicated that Members should have a role in the creation of a constitution for the Foundation Trust.

Members noted that as it was the Government's policy to create Foundation Trusts, it was not appropriate for this Forum to support or not support this application. However, Members were keen to be involved in the development of a Constitution.

Members were requested to give delegated authority to the Chair, in conjunction with the Scrutiny Support Officer, to finalise a response to the consultation of North Tees and Hartlepcol Trust's application for Foundation Status.

Decision

That delegated authority be granted to the Chair, in conjunction with the Scrutiny Support Officer to finalise a response to the consultation of North Tees and Hartlepool Trust's application for Foundation Trust status based on the key issues outlined above.

125. Social Prescribing – Draft Final Report (Adult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum)

The Scrutiny Support Officer submitted the Draft Final Report of this Forum following their on-going enquiry into Social Prescribing.

During this inquiry the Forum:

- 1) Examined detailed Officer reports supplemented by verbal evidence;
- 2) Were provided with evidence from:
 - (i) The Authority's Portfolio Holder for Adult and Public Health Services;
 - (ii) Representatives from HVDA; Hartlepool PCT, Hartlepool MIND, Hartlepool NDC
- 3) Examined good practice that existed within a neighbouring Local Authority;
- 4) Received the views of local service users.

The Forum's key recommendations to Council and Hartlepool PCT were to be championed by both organisations for implementation and action and were as follows:

- (a) That the authority agrees that Social Prescribing is a priority and use the evidence gathered through this investigation, and other studies to agree a framew ork for Hartlepool;
- (b) That work is undertaken locally to standardise the definition of Social Prescribing;

- (c) That work is undertaken to establish a clear picture of Social Prescribing projects currently offered in Hartlepool or those than can be encompassed within the definition of Social Prescribing with a view to standardising issues such as the availability of information, data protection, referral routes and evaluation;
- (d) That Social Prescribing be linked to the Public Health Strategy outcomes;
- (e) That Social Prescribing be incorporated within the Voluntary Sector Strategy Development;
- (f) That Social Prescribing be linked to any future Commissioning strategies;
- (g) That funding streams to support Social Prescribing in the long-term be considered;
- (h) That the Council link the outcomes of the FACS consultation to developing Social Prescribing;
- (i) That work is undertaken by HBC and HPCT with the PBC Group in a bid to increase the level of support for Social Prescribing;
- That work be undertaken to identify target groups who would benefit from Social Prescribing initiatives, including carers and hard to reach groups;
- (k) That capacity issues be considered within the VCS in conjunction with plans to develop Social Prescribing;

Decision

That delegated authority be given to the Chair, in conjunction with the Scrutiny Support Officer to finalise the report for submission to Scrutiny Coordinating Committee for endorsement on 27th April 2007.

126. Draft Final Report - Response to Hartlepool PCTs Consultation on its Proposed Management

Arr ange ments (Adult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum)

The Scrutiny Support Officer submitted the Draft Final Report of this Forum following their on-going enquiry into Social Prescribing.

During this inquiry the Forum had received evidence, a detailed in previous minutes of meetings. Due to the limited time available to undertake this inquiry, the key method of investigation involved detailed reports supplemented by verbal evidence by representatives of Hartlepool Primary Care Trust.

Hartlepool PCT

- (a) That future consultation/engagement exercises undertaken by Hartlepool PCT comply at a minimum with the Cabinet Office Code of Practice on written consultations;
- (b) That consultation processes are planned clearly with identifiable markers identifying where Scrutiny can input into the process;
- (c) That the PCT submit an update report to this Forum on the development of the management structure including plans for Joint Commissioning with the Council together with the terms of reference for any Tees and North wide Joint Committees.

Hartlepool Borough Council

(d) That the Executive draws to the attention of national and regional organisations, such as the LGA and ANEC, the nature of the legal advice received by this Local Authority, namely that consultation on proposed management arrangements are subject to a formal statutory consultation processes.

During the discussion which ensued it was noted that as identified earlier in this meeting, a draft protocol would be written in partnership with Hartlepool Council and Hartlepool PCT in relation to future consultation arrangements. The Chair referred to Sir lan Caruthers statement that "The NHS approach to consultation was below standard and that the bar should be raised."

Decision

That delegated authority be given to the Chair, in conjunction with the Scrutiny Support Officer to finalise the report for consideration by Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee on 27th April 2007.

Members had recently been invited to participate in a Scrutiny Committee at Easington District Council in relation to the proposals for the University Hospital of Hartlepool. It had proved a very valuable and enjoyable meeting. 132 Minutes of the meeting held on 29 March 2007

136 Hartlepool PCT – 'Annual Healthcheck' (Scrutiny Support Officer)

The Scrutiny Support Officer advised that under a new quality checking regime of the Healthcare Commission, health scrutiny committees had the opportunity to comment on Trust performance. Any comments made by a Health Scrutiny Forum would be inserted into the Trust's declaration of performance against the standards as unedited contributions.

A representative from Hartlepool PCT provided a presentation which set out the core standards and the Trust's evidenced performance against those targets which included:-

- Hartlepool's vision for care
- Standards for better health
- Details of 5 areas of insufficient assurance
- Action Plans for all areas of insufficient assurance
- Progress to date on Action Plans
- Details of assessment process
- Current position

• Future proposals

In conclusion, Members were advised that assurance could be taken from the systems already in existence which included the Standards for Better Health assessment process, Assurance Framework, Statement of Internal Control and Audit Commission Annual Statement.

A Member queried how the PCT reconfiguration affected this process to which the Trust representative advised that the two organisations had been assessed and monitored separately.

The representatives left the meeting and sought Members comments by the following day. It was suggested that the Scrutiny Support Officer provide a written response to the PCT on behalf of the Forum in consultation with the Chair.

Recommendation

That the information given, be noted and the Scrutiny Support Officer provide a written response to the PCT on behalf of the Forum.

137 North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust – 'Annual Healthcheck' (Scrutiny Support Officer)

The Scrutiny Support Officer advised that under a new quality checking regime of the Healthcare Commission, health scrutiny committees had the opportunity to comment on Trust performance. Any comments made by a Health Scrutiny Forum would be inserted into the Trust's declaration of performance against the standards as unedited contributions.

A representative from North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust presented the report which set out the core standards and the Trust's evidenced performance against those standards.

It was reported that the Annual Healthcheck was subject to changes from the previous year. There were 22 changes which had led to a full apprais al of the 24 core standards which were disaggregated into 46 sub-standards. Each of the 46 sub-standards had been review ed to assess compliance. A project plan had been developed and was attached at Appendix A. Last year the Trust had two areas of non-compliance, details of which were outlined. The Trust had placed significant emphasis on achieving actions plans initiated to ensure compliance for 06/07. This had delivered a positive outcome. The Trust had carried out a comprehensive review of evidence available to assess level of compliance, details of which were set out in Appendix B. As such the Trust, under core standards was declaring compliance. With regard to developmental standards, excellent developmental progress in relation to safety had been proposed with good developmental progress in relation to clinical and cost effectiveness. Members view s were sought on the Trust's declaration.

Discussion ensued in which the following issues were raised:-

With regard to the clinical and cost effectiveness aspect, what would constitute excellent? It was reported that there were 48 different standards in one directorate. One of the requirements for compliance was to ensure there was a process in place to receive, implement and undertake audits on each of the standards. Whilst it had been acknowledged that excellent systems and processes were in place each individual standard had not been audited.

Do you consider the transfer to foundation status is positive in terms of achieving the core standards? The representative advised that this was monitored by the Health Care Clinical Excellence which was equally as important as well as customer choice and the requirement to maintain the level of care to core standards.

138 Quorate Meeting

Councillors Geoff Lilley and Mary Fleet joined the meeting and it was noted that the meeting was now quorate.

139 North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust – 'Annual Healthcheck' (Scrutiny Support Officer)

What was the current waiting times for patient appointments? The North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust representative advised that at present all patients received an appointment within 20 weeks.

Discussion ensued in relation to the difficulties experienced by some patients treated at North Tees Hospital without their own transport. The representative provided clarification on the circumstances in which an ambulance was provided as well as the alternative options available.

The Forum welcomed that the Trust was intending to declare full compliance with the 24 core standards. .

Decision

- (i) That the information given, be noted and the Trust's full compliance with the 24 core standards, be welcomed.
- (i) That the Scrutiny Support Officer be authorised to provide a written response to the Trust on behalf of the Forum, in consultation with the Chair.

- Subject: THE ROLE OF THE ADULT AND COMMUNITY SERVICES AND HEALTH SCRUTINY FORUM

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To give an overview of the role and functions of the Adult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Council's approach to Overview and Scrutiny has been informed by government guidance, best practice nationally and experience of what works locally to ensure that the Scrutiny Forum's operate in an optimum scrutiny structure that will enable the Forums to add value and improve services for the residents of Hartlepool.
- 2.2 The role of the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee is briefly discussed in the following section. Following this in Sections 4 and 5, there are more detailed descriptions of the roles and functions of this forum.

3. ROLE AND FUNCTIONS OF THE SCRUTINY CO-OR DINATING COM MITTEE

3.1 The Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee is made up of the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of the four standing Forums and a further two Members from each Forum. This approach enables the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee to draw on the experience of a variety of Members, represent a cross-section of political views and equally represent each of the four standing Forums. The Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee is responsible for the overall management of overview and scrutiny within the Authority. Other authorities' experience of scrutiny appears to have benefited from the establishment of such a body. Given the increasing importance of the scrutiny role under the new arrangements and the likely increase in workbad of the scrutiny function the



role of the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee is invaluable. The main roles and functions of the committee are as follow s:-

- i) To work with the four forums to decide an annual overview and scrutiny work programme, including the programme of any ad-hoc forum that it appoints, to ensure that there is efficient use of the forums and that the potential for duplication of effort is minimised.
- ii) To lead the involvement of overview and scrutiny in the development of the budget and the plans and strategies that make up the policy framew ork and to delegate issues for consideration to the forums.
- iii) Where matters fall within the remit of more than one overview and scrutiny forum, to determine which of them will assume responsibility for any particular issue and to resolve any issues of dispute between overview and scrutiny forums.
- iv) To receive requests from Members, the Executive and/or the Full Council for items to be considered by overview and scrutiny for ums and to allocate them, if appropriate to one or more overview and scrutiny forum.
- v) To put in place and maintain a system to ensure reports from overview and scrutiny to the executive are managed efficiently and do not exceed any limits set out in this constitution (this includes making decisions about the priority of reports, if the volume of such reports creates difficulty for the management of executive business or jeopardises the efficient running of the council business).
- vi) To exercise the power of call in in relation to Executive decisions made as set out in Section 21 (3) of the Local Government Act 2000, or allocate them to the appropriate overview and scrutiny forum for consideration.

4. FUNCTIONS OF OV ERVIEW AND SCRUTINY FORUM S

- 4.1 The four standing Overview and Scrutiny Forums have three main functions and these are set out in the following paragraphs:
 - (a) Policy Development and Review.

Overview and Scrutiny Forums may:

- (i) Assist the Council and the Executive in the development of the budget and policy framew ork by in-depth analysis of policy issues;
- (ii) Conduct research, community and other consultation in the analysis of policy issues and possible options;
- (iii) Consider and implement mechanisms to encourage and enhance community participation in the development of policy options;

- (iv) Question Members of the Executive and Chief Officers about their views on issues and proposals affecting the area;
- (v) Liaise with other external organisations operating in the area, whether national, regional or local, to ensure that the interests of local people are enhanced by collaborative working
- (b) Scrutiny

Overview and Scrutiny Forums may:

- (i) Review and scrutinise the decisions of the executive and chief officers both in relation to individual decisions and their overall strategic direction.
- (ii) Review and scrutinise the work of the Council in relation to its policy objectives, performance targets and/or particular service areas.
- (iii) Question members of the executive and chief officers about their decisions, whether generally in comparison with the service plans and targets over a period of time, or in relation to particular decisions, initiatives or projects.
- (iv) Review and scrutinise the performance of other public bodies in the area, requesting them to attend and address relevant scrutiny forums to speak about their activities and performance;
- (v) Investigate other issues of local concern, outside the control of the Council and other public bodies in the area, and make recommendations to the Council, the executive and/or other organisations arising from the outcome of the scrutiny process.
- (v) Question and gather evidence from any person (with their consent)
- (vi) Make recommendations to the executive and/or the council arising from the outcome of the scrutiny process.
- (c) Finance

Overview and Scrutiny Committees may exercise overall responsibility for the finances made available to them. This presently consists of a dedicated overview and scrutiny budget of 50k. Applications for funding must be made through Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee.

5. THE REMIT OF THIS FORUM

5.1 The strategic direction of the Scrutiny Forums will be to assess, monitor and advise on the Council's progress tow ards the 7 priority aims of the Community

Strategy whilst the operational direction of the individual Scrutiny Forums will be governed by the remits outlined in the Constitution.

The remit of the A dult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum is as follow s:-

To consider issues relating to specialist targeted and universal services in relation to Adults, culture and leisure and to exercise the powers of the Health and Social Care Act 2001 in considering the provision of health services at both local and regional level.

- 5.2 There will be, how ever, from time to time, be issues that could be considered by more than one forum and it will be for the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee to determine which forum should examine a particular issue. It is also open to the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee to appoint ad hoc forums. For example, where an issue comes within the remit of two scrutiny forums, the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee could decide to establish an ad hoc forum made up of four Members from each of those two Forums.
- 5.3 The Forum will undertake the Council's role in scrutinising the health service. Health Scrutiny is a responsibility given to Local Authority scrutineers under the Health and Social Care Act 2001. It expands upon powers given under the Local Government Act, which created the Overview and Scrutiny function so that elected members could examine local services and policies and look for ways to improve them. Health Scrutiny has much wider responsibilities, looking not only at local authorities themselves, but also at all health service providers and any other factors that affect people's health.
- 5.4 Members of the Forum also have a key role to play in joint scrutiny across the Tees Valley area and with additional local partners such as Stockton on Tees Borough Council, Durham County Council and Sedgefield and Easington District Councils whose residents are often served by the same health service providers.

2. BACKGROUNDINFORMATION

- 2.1 The Adult and Community Services and Health Scrutiny Forum needs to develop a Work Programme for the 2007/08 Municipal Year, together with a timeframe for each review, for consideration by the Scrutiny Coordinating Committee on 29 June 2007. Detailed terms of reference should be developed at the start of each review.
- 2.2 As such the Director of Adult and Community Services, Assistant Chief Executive for Hartlepool PCT, Assistant Chief Executive for North Tees and Hartlepool NHS Trust; Cabinet Members for Adult and Public Health Services and Culture, Leisure and Tourism; Local Area Agreement Rew ard Element Targets (Also known as LPSA2); Corporate Performance Plan (BVPP); the View point Surveys; and consultation with Patient and Public Involvement Forum's have been the foundation sources for this report to enable the Forum to compile its Work Programme.
- 2.3 How ever, it should be appreciated that some of the areas detailed below are continually evolving and further details will emerge throughout the year.
- 2.4 Members may also wish to factor into the work programme time to contribute to 'the annual healthcheck', which provides for overview and scrutiny committees to participate in the self-assessment process for NHS Trusts. NHS Trusts are expected to ask all Scrutiny Forums in their area for their view s on the standards. The Healthcare Commission is clear that Members "are not expected to have an in-depth, expert knowledge about all the



services that a trust is providing and being assessed on". It is anticipated that the Trust(s) will publish a draft declaration in April 2007.

- 2.5 In conducting health scrutiny Members may wish to note that the Health Scrutiny Regulations enable scrutiny committees to request the attendance of an officer from a local NHS body to answer questions and NHS bodies are under a duty to comply with these requests.
- 2.6 In addition to establishing the Forum's Work Programme, the Forum may consider it appropriate to receive illustrations from service departments in relation to impending legislation and to respond on an ad hoc basis to emerging issues which would be considered appropriate for an investigation or review to be undertaken.

- 2.10 The Forum may also wish to apply a degree of emphasis on a particular source for example, would the Forum consider issues which are clearly raised as a concern by the public to carry more weight than those considered important by the service provider? In practice the Forum will need to apply a considered opinion from all sources against the individual subject area.
- 2.11 Once the Forum has identified Scrutiny topics, anticipated time frames need to be applied. It is suggested to the Forum that a standard template for applying time allocations should be treated with caution as when scoping a subject a number of complexities may arise, therefore the anticipated duration should be allocated to the subjects on an individual basis.

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Key achievements in 2006/07

- The Headland sports hall and fitness suite developed as an extension to the Borough Hall was opened for business in February 2006, usages have exceeded all expectations and new courses are constantly being developed to meet demand
- The Maritime Festival in July 2006 was a success, attracting circa 60,000 visitors
- Hartlepool, in partnership with PD Ports and Hartlepool Marina, successfully bid to be Tall Ships Host Port 2010 and work planning this has commenced with key partners
- Successful HLF Lottery bid for £250k was submitted to secure the conversion and restoration of PSS Wingfield Castle as an education resource centre as part of the Hartlepool Maritime Experience capital developments. This HLF success was complemented by the success of the Heugh Gun Battery Trust in achieving a £300k HLF award for their restoration and interpretation
- Hartlepool was the only UK venue for The Face of Asia exhibition by Steve McCurry, which was a resounding success, followed in December 2006 with landscape photographer Jo Cornish incorporating locally commissioned work
- The rene wal of the Waverly allotment site and the re-establishment of Briarfields allotments have been successfully achieved, the former with involvement from the learning disabilities unit who will be developing a comprehensive practical unit

Key achievements in 2006/07

- Working with local communities, Neighbourhood Action Plans (NAPs) have been updated for both Dyke House/Stranton/Grange and Burbank areas, and work on updating the Rift House/Burn Valley Plan is under way. We have also assisted New Deal for Communities in completing a NAP for their area.
- Around £350,000 of Neighbourhood Renewal Fund Residents Priorities Budget has been spent across NAP areas, on priorities identified in Neighbourhood Action Plans.
- We have undertaken a review of the NAP process and commenced implementation of its many recommendations including for example, how to involve more residents in the process and achieve a good geographical spread of participants.
- The Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) showing how residents and the broader community can get involved in the preparation of newland-use plans and consideration of planning applications was adopted in October 2006.
- Residents continue to be involved in the ongoing development and governance of the Housing Market Renewal (HMR) programme across central Hartlepool
- A Best Value Review of Strengthening Communities has been undertaken with the Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS) and a Strategic Improvement Plan developed to improve performance in this aspect of the Council's work.
- Hartlepool Borough Council has achieved Beacon Status for emergency planning in partnership with the other 3 authorities in 'Cleveland and Cleveland Police and Cleveland Fire Brigade. The Cleveland Emergency Planning Unit made a joint bid for Beacon Status, with the main theme being partnership working through the emergency planning unit.

In 5-10 years time: -

• There will be an increased range of services and activities that have been developed and delivered in partnership with local communities.

- The public will be reassured through a wareness of the emergency planning arrangements that are in place and which are continually reviewed.
- Information on how the public can protect themselves during an emergency will be enhanced.

Subject: APPOINTMENT TO OUTSIDE BODIES - HEALTH SCRUTINY NOMINATIONS TO THE TEES VALLEY JO INT HEALTH SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek Councillor nominations to the Tees Valley Joint Health Scrutiny Committee.

2. BACKGROUND

The Health and Social Care Scrutiny Forum, held on the 17th January 2003, approved the adoption of the draft Tees Valley Health Scrutiny Protocol. A key element of the protocol was the establishment of a Tees Valley Health Scrutiny Joint Committee to facilitate the exchange of information about scrutiny work; to consider proposals for joint scrutiny exercises; and to carry out joint scrutiny exercises.

The committee consists of 15 members, 3 from each of the Tees Valley authorities, selected on the basis of political proportionality. Three nominations are now sought from this Scrutiny Forum for Hartlepool's representatives on this new committee (2 Labour and 1 A dministrative Group).

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

That three nominations (2 Labour and 1 Administrative Group) be made to the Tees Valley Health Scrutiny Joint Committee.
