1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider an application for a new Premises Licence in respect of the Heugh Gun Battery, Moor Terrace, Hartlepool.

2. SUMMARY OF APPLICATION

- 2.1 Applicant: Heugh Gun Battery Trust Limited
 - Premises: Heugh Battery Moor Terrace The Headland Hartlepool
- 2.2 The application is for the following activities:

1.	Supply of Alcohol (On sales)	Monday – Thursday Friday and Saturday Sundays	
2.	Films (Indoors)	Monday – Sunday	10:00 to 16:00
3.	Live music (Indoors and outdoors)	Sunday – Thursday Friday and Saturday	
4.	Recorded music (Indoors and outdoors)	Monday – Thursday Friday – Sunday	10:00 to 16:00 10:00 to 22:30
5.	Provision of facilities for Dancing (Indoors)	Monday –Thursday Friday and Saturday Sundays	10:00 to 16:00 10:00 to 22:30 10:00 to 21:00

3. BACKGROUND

3.1 The application has been advertised in the prescribed manner and eight representations have been received from interested parties. Seven of which

are from local residents (see **Appendices 2 to 8**) and one is from the Headland Parish Council (see **Appendix 9**).

- 3.2 The representations received refer to crime and disorder, (anti-social behaviour), public nuisance (late night disturbance) and public safety.
- 3.3 Following receipt of the above representations, and in compliance with statutory requirements, a Notice of Hearing has been sent to the applicant and those making representations.

4. **ISSUES**

- 4.1 As relevant representations have been received within the prescribed time period, a hearing must be held for Members to consider those representations (unless all parties agree a hearing is unnecessary).
- 4.2 The applicant has agreed to a number of conditions that will be attached to the licence, should it be granted. These include the installation of a CCTV system, a 'Challenge 21' approach to under age sales (whereby anyone under the age of 21 would be required to produce proof of age) staff training and the monitoring of sales.
- 4.3 Having regard to the representations received, Members may take any of the following steps for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - i) Grant the application without amendment
 - ii) Grant the application in part and/or with conditions or amended conditions
 - iii) Refuse the application
- 4.4 The licensing objectives are:
 - i) The prevention of crime and disorder
 - ii) Public safety
 - iii) The prevention of public nuisance, and
 - iv) The protection of children from harm
- 4.5 Members are reminded that they must only consider those aspects of the licence application that are relevant to the representations received.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

5.1 That members consider the representations made by the applicant and interested parties and determine what aspects, if any, of the proposed application should be granted and, if appropriate, what conditions, if any, should be attached.

a) General - all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e) (please read guidance note 9)

The four licensing objectives will be promoted and enforced through staff training and raising awareness. Policies in existance will be used to ensure that all preventative measures are taken. Signage will used to enforce policies and staffing levels will reflect the number of people at the venue.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder: Due to the attraction being situated within a residential a service for booking taxis directly from the venue will be offered throughout the day and evening at any functions to prevent crime and disorder within the area. Signage will be placed around the premises requesting that visitors leave the venue in a peaceful manner. CCTV is in place across the venue to ensure all activities are monitored both on and immediately off the site, any relevany CCTV footage will be given to the Police. Police Community Support Officers are liaised with regularly to ensure that they are kept informed of activities on the attraction and to enable the attraction to install any recommendations offered by the Police. To prevent crime and disorder all evening events will be ticket only or restricted numbers to ensure that those present can be supervised effectively.

If any alcohol is to be consumed outdoors then it will be given in a plastic cup or bottle to prevent glass breakages. No drinks may be taken from the premises at any point and this will be monitored by staff at the front door. Toilets will be checked every 30 minutes as they are not clearly visible from the bar, they will also be monitored by CCTV.

If a member of staff believes that the sale of alcohol to a customer will result in crime or disorder they have the right to refuse a sale.

c) Public safety

To ensure public safety current policies will be followed to ensure that no glasses are taken outside and that all fire fighting equipment is services regularly. The local fire service will regularly be invited to the venue for a tour so that they are aware of the layout of the building. The venue will always have a first aider on present and this will be advertised to visitors. All exhibits at the visitors attraction will be secured out of the reach of customers.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

To prevent any noise from customers leaving the premises disturbing members of the public signage will be placed near all exits requesting consideration be shown to the local residents. A member of staff will be stationed at each exit to ensure that customers leave the premises in an orderly manner. A service will offered at the museum so that all visitors can request that a taxi is ordered for them at a specific time so that they are removed from the area of the venue directly. All visitors awaiting taxis will be invited to wait indoors to prevent local residents being disturbed.

e) The protection of children from harm

Children are only allowed at the attraction if they are accompanied by an adult over the age of 18 years, they will also be asked to leave the premises at 20:00. To protect children from potentially consuming alcohol signs will be placed in all buildings advising that alcohol will not be sold to those under the age of 18 and that it is an offence to sell or be sold alcohol to a minor. All members of staff will enforce a strict policy that all people who attempt to purchase alcohol who appear to be under the age of 21 will be requested to show a valid form of photographic I.D. the forms of I.D. accepted will be a UK drivers licence, passport or PASS card.Information relating to the I.D. accepted will be positioned in the areas selling alcohol. Staff will undergo training as recommended by the PASS scheme website regularly.



I write to you in the company of my neighbours, all of whom dwell within the precinct affected, to put forward my strongest objections to this application for a license to serve alcoholic drinks and provide entertainment, at the premises known as The Heugh Battery, here on The Headland.

The Battery Trust have shown themselves on numerous occasions to be unfit managers of such responsibility. A pertinent example of which was the worst night of local alcohol-fuelled violence and damage in this area to date, during the Battery Trust's inaugural dinner. When asked to intervene, the principals refused to act.

Addendum to the recent objections raised with respect to the granting of an entertainments and drinks license to the proprietors of the Heugh Battery.

In addition to our simple objections to this folly, couched as they must be, in simple terms, I would draw the attention of the Council Public Safety department to the incidents of today as a simple and salient example of the patent unsuitability, as licensees, of the battery operators.

Not satisfied with disrupting the area by the illegal discharge of firearms, the owners of this monument to no factual historic incident worthy of remembrance or reenactment whatsoever, block the highway and thoroughfare whenever they see fit, and moreover falsely use police property with which to illegally enforce their blockade.

I am but lately informed by my local parish councilor that the discharge of firearms "*is with permission*".

I can assist here by relating the verifiably simple information that the Highways Act of 1980 provides that it is an offence to discharge a firearm within 50 feet of the centre of a public highway.

I can further provide that no local authority has the power to overturn statute in this way. If such were the case then local authority would also be able to suspend statutory law in cases of rape or murder for example, which it may have deemed unsuitable for hearing. The power to second guess parliament has never rested with local functionaries, and with good reason.

Since testimony seems to be ineffectual against whatever political protection is being afforded the battery, instead I here reproduce simple photographic proof of the denial of right of way on this date and the illegal use of police property to enforce this denial.

Also included are photographs of the illegal denial of access on the previous day, using the same means, and the illegal cordoning of a section of the highway adjacent to the battery.

At no time have any permissions been sought, nor granted, neither has consultation, or even notice been provided to the residents who are immediately local, and therefore most affected by such privations.

Additional to the recent objections raised with respect to the granting of an entertainments and drinks license to the proprietors of the Heugh Battery.

The illegal blockading of a public thoroughfare by the battery trust, compounding as it does, the regular illegal discharging of firearms close to houses, is an indicative and blatant example of the type of anti-social behaviour we have been forced to accept. Forced, not only by this megalomaniacal trust but also by the inactivity and inertia within Cleveland police... who's equipment can be clearly be seen being put to prohibited use here, on the occasion of the last blockade.

One might already guess at the denials from the police that the fact of one of their officers chairing this trust has naturally nothing to do with their lack of enthusiasm to apply the law here. But then police denial is far more in evidence these days when it concerns law applied to police, than it is regarding the law which is sold to the rest of us.

If that were not the case then we should not be policed and sold law by officers, in excess of one in ten of whom, already come with their own personal criminal records... some of which concern violent crime as well as dishonesty.

I have personally been ignored in my efforts to get the politically compromised mayor and corporation to even consider the matter. Representations having been ignored by the mayor, we were then passed to planning... who, cognisant of the precarious position of any local bureaucrat who is not a diversity manager or street football coordinator, consequently refused to act either.

The Highways Act is in breach on every single occasion that discharges are permitted from these supposed re-enactments of incidents which themselves have absolutely nothing to do with the site nor it's environs. The Highways Act is statutory law and therefore not capable of suspension by local ordinance or byelaw.

Anti-social behaviour law is also in breach on each separate occasion.

Human rights law... the right to the peaceful enjoyment and occupation of one's home... is also flouted by people, none of whom it is significant to note would permit such behaviour in their homes.

The recent condescending statement from the battery trust, published in what passes for a local newspaper but which is specifically as impartial as the bbc when local authority speaks, quoted the admission from someone named Baume. Thus proving both the arrogant presumption, and the adage that military intelligence is a contradiction in terms... unless immunity is already assured, as would appear.

I am a long-term resident of Moor Terrace and I do not accept the apology in the statement. And much good may that do me.

Furthermore, I deeply resent the implication implicit in the statement and the admission that ... "we **<u>had</u>** to block the road off". This implies authority to perform this criminal act in the first place, and presumption to repeat it, should it be deemed necessary... by the trust.

In addition to this, as a disabled and practicably housebound resident with an increasingly delicate constitution, I take issue with this behaviour and the arrogance in exhibition thereof, on behalf of any resident who may need the emergency services during a bout of this antiquated militaristic despotism.

To blockade roads and to discharge firearms at will is the typical behaviour of an occupying army. I for one will not submit to it without protest, and despite the blatantly obvious political protection being afforded to the occupiers.

The reasons why I have refrained hitherto from pursuing this as I do now have far more to do with manifestly evident police harassment of anyone involved in complaints in which they are concerned, and who therefore present easy targets for administrative convictions.

Whilst police intimidation is something that I may personally be able to endure although not without profound and detrimental effects upon my personal well-being, on the only other occasion it was tried, they left my wife completely terrified and shaken to the core. I merely wish to illustrate quite clearly how this matter has not been dealt with, in this way, prior to this.

Re: The Heugh Battery

As I informed the council repeatedly in my missives, so it seems I must re-iterate to you. I am not available for meetings either at your convenience in semi-public venues nor elsewhere. I do not intend to explain this further to you except to simply state that this is consequent to, and arising from, the disability which increasingly affects my daily life. I also appreciate that you are not at liberty to discriminate upon grounds of disability and this may pose some difficulty. However a public statement from those missives already submitted upon this subject, by me, seems to me to perfectly cover the legal requirement.

If, as I suspect, this license is granted upon this occasion, or upon the occasion of the inevitable appeal... as frequently happens in other similarly blighted areas of the town... the inevitable review will require to know how residents views were so disregarded and how public safety was put at so small a consequence. And precisely who were the officers involved.

We are currently enduring yet another weekend of local state-sanctioned bombardment. Yesterday it was evident that the site received little attention from the many visitors who attended the Heritage Festival at the town hall, but sufficient evidently to cause the battery authority... surely itself a contradiction in terms... to permit the detonation of several dozen rounds, largely for their own amusement.

I have informed myself lately that true re-enactors are granted firearms certificates from the local police in order that the weapons they wield are authentic. This means that the firearms in the hands of these people are therefore live and un-fettered.

Whilst this pyrotechnic playtime progressed yesterday, my next door neighbour had occasion to take his life in his hands and paint the front of his house. This necessitated his use of ladders. He reported several occasions, as I previously predicted, in which he started so violently from the shockwave and the noise from these random and violent explosions that he was placed very much at hazard during his time aloft.

Whilst filling and sanding during the afternoon he had several occasions to over- look into to the area in which these explosions were being caused. He reported that whilst

much of the explosions were in progress, the wielders of these lethal weapons were in fact pointing them at each other and indulging in mock battle behaviour.

Perhaps you are not aware, but the police ought to be, that discharging a firearm... even when loaded with blanks... constitutes a hazard. In deactivated and imitation firearms the discharge hazard is to the side of the firearm, since the muzzle is necessarily blocked. In firearms which have not been subject to de-activation, the hazard is from the discharge of the powder used in the rounds. Normally this is the older type of powder used in firearms of some antiquity... flintlocks and percussion.

The reason that this propellant is frequently used in blanks, over the later smokeless powder, is that the discharge is generally more sonically violent and inevitably results in a cloud of smoke. However black powder is also known to be very comparatively undependable... for example it will detonate from the static discharge of a nylon garment, and can easily cluster if stored for long periods or subject to any moisture... such as that which ladens our local atmosphere constantly.

On this consequence, a discharge travelling down the unrestricted barrel of a firearm will issue in the form of a lump of red hot cinder, and inevitably hit and burn wherever or whomever it is aimed at.

Legitimate shooting venues are in the charge of a qualified range officer, who takes complete responsibility for all discharges and their consequences. There is no such similar organisation evident in the mis-behaviour that we have also witnessed ourselves, from the seaward side of the Heugh Battery upon the occasions of my necessary daily exercise.

Finally I would like to draw to your attention, as principal licensing officer, to the fact that the Heugh Battery and it's environs are a council-designated alcohol free zone, and this in itself would inevitably present a complete contradiction, should such a license be seriously contemplated.

Perhaps you would be good enough to forward a copy of this letter also to police professional standards, who are already in receipt of previous communications on this subject.

Dear sir,

I acknowledge receipt of your letter dated 22nd July 2009.

I take issue with your contention that the additional matters which I raised do not impinge upon the license application.

Indeed I would point out that they speak to the very character of the proposed licensee(s), and exhibit precisely the kind of irresponsible and anti-social behaviour which is supposedly behind enquiries as to the fitness of a licensee to preside over such premises.

I had already directed the same matters, which you incorrectly categorise as irrelevant, to the professional standards department at cleveland police. In keeping with current police behaviour, we believe that they are "pursuing enquiries" which will inevitably lead to the inertia, so often obtaining when it concerns a police officer. We do not include their usual prefix of "serving", as so little evidence of that function remains with which to do so now.

I have been a licensee in the past, and I went through the application and provision process. I was deemed a responsible pillar of the community by a full magistrates court sitting at that time, and as a licensee I was forbidden to permit behaviour the like of which is plainly exhibited by this management at this venue. Behaviour which is in fact itself condoning and creating a breach of the peace and an illegal blockade of the Queen's Highway, and also behaviour which is likely to cause "crime and disorder", and is certainly a "public nuisance"... there was a car crash outside our door as a direct result, and the massive traffic disruption was even quoted in the local paper.

The denizens of that gulag across the road from us are not fit and proper persons to be entrusted with the sale of intoxicating liquors, nor the responsibility of presiding over whatever perversion they may deem to be entertainment, or indeed that they care to hire their premises out for.

We were treated to a prime example of their efforts in "preventing crime and disorder" and "prevention of public nuisance" in the examples I described to you of their inaugural dinner in which this immediate area of The Headland was subject to the worst night of anti-social behaviour and unrest that we have suffered in the last twenty years. And despite there being a police officer in attendance at that very venue, when required to attend to the disturbance, he *served* this community by refusing and then by absenting himself from the proceedings.

The blockading of a public road without even bothering to seek the necessary permissions, and the use of police cones to reinforce this illegal action, are very much to the point of the creation of hazard to "public safety", the perpetration of "public nuisance", and the commission of "crime and disorder."

I would urge that you review your own criteria with regard to this matter. Your cavalier disregard of the issues which I drew to your attention, as prime examples of the unsuitability of this location and this supposedly responsible body, speaks to the political protection which apparently has been afforded this venture on each and every occasion that it has offended... both the written law... and the residents of this area.

When you write to me that you do not believe that this behaviour impinges upon their fitness for a license of this sort, you simply reinforce my contention that the entire issue is already politically, a foregone conclusion.

And when you grant this license... as it now appears perfectly obvious to me that you will... either at the first hearing, or as with the wine-bar blighted town centre, on appeal, we will be left with the results. As we were, on the occasion of their inauguration, and with the same "public protection"... no attendance by police, as one was already on the scene, but that one evidently did not care to sell us any law that night.

We do not want this venue. We do not wish it to be part of the community. It has no justification historically or indeed as any kind of community amenity but the one it formerly occupied... as a hide for the now-evicted birdwatchers. The only people who do support this fully, are those who are not a real part of this community.

Furthermore and to the point of these "memorials" in general, no serving officer to whom I ever made enquiry ever wanted to remember anything or indeed be reminded about, any war that he was actually in. They invariably made comments which summed up, resulted in "that sort of thing was invariably left to officers who were in the *pay corps*", by which they meant men who never saw action. It is also the case you will find, if you care to look, that these memorials are indeed so unpopular in general that many far-better-positioned and provisioned venues have indeed gone bankrupt and closed... the Leeds Armouries itself has only recently survived closure by the very narrowest margin indeed.

This venue is populated, by definition, with people who's sole raison d'etre is precisely the same as the one that the police used to perpetrate only one of their lengthening list of recent major miscarriages of justice... an unhealthy fascination with dangerous weapons of war, and pivotally for them, without the risks and responsibility entailed by real soldiers. Your own failure to take this simple evidence into account as a salient factor is itself germane to my own allegations of political protection.

The entire establishment is based upon a fantasy and a fascination, which the police themselves have held on many previous occasions to be a contributing factor towards crime and disorder, and have variously described as unhealthy.

The list of contradictory *official* support, and this patent exhibition of bureaucratic myopia is therefore thrown into ever-more stark relief.

This is a council-designated alcohol-free zone. That the matter of licensing and alcohol distribution in it has not been summarily dismissed on those grounds alone, clearly illustrates that the so-called public safety aspect of the council itself is perversely contemplating permitting the sale and distribution of alcohol in an area which they themselves identified and categorised as requiring prohibition.

When the anti-social behaviour reports start coming in, and the demands for poll tax reductions due to council-sponsored deterioration of the area by the device of forcing a drinking establishment upon the residents, then those who facilitated this exercise in the alcohol-fuelled provision of a retirement career for a police officer and some militaristic dreams of a last command for an allegedly retired soldier, must also... and appropriately take full responsibility for the results.



On behalf of local residents, the Hartlepool Headland Parish Council wishes to make a representation against granting of an alcohol and music license to the Heugh Gun Battery on the Headland, Hartlepool.

We have received complaints regarding this proposal from local residents concerned about the public nuisance which this license will cause, allowing as it will, alcoholic drinking and loud music to be played only meters from their front doors. It must be remembered that these houses have no gardens to separate the public highway from their front doors and mainly single glazed windows. Granting this license will greatly affect, the standard of living, if not the safety of these residents, living within their own homes.

Also, due consideration must be given to the fact that the Heugh Gun Battery is within the Headland Conservation Area.
