1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider an application for the review of a premises licence in respect of The Loft, 56 Church Street, Hartlepool.

2.2 The current licence authorises the following activities between 1000 and 0400 hours on Monday to Sunday inclusive: -

- 1. Alcohol Sales (On & Off Licence)
- 2. Live Music
- 3. Recorded Music
- 4. Performance of Dance
- 5. Anything Similar to 2, 3 or 4 above
- 6. Provisions of Facilities for Making Music
- 7. Provisions of Facilities for Dancing
- 8. Entertainment Similar to 6 or 7 above
- 2.3 A copy of the premises licence is attached as **Appendix I**.
- 2.4 A copy of the application for review, including Police witness statement, is attached as **Appendix II**.
- 2.5 The application for review refers to the following licensing objectives:
 - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 Cleveland Police has requested a review of the premises licence on the grounds that there have been numerous incidents, including violence and anti-social behaviour, within the premises which have undermined the licensing objectives.
- 3.2 The application for review has been advertised in the prescribed manner and no additional representations have been received.

4. **ISSUES**

- 4.1 An application for the review of a licence is made under Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application must be made by either a Responsible Authority or Interested Party as defined by the Act. Cleveland Police are a Responsible Authority.
- 4.2 The application must also relate to at least one of the Act's 'licensing objectives'. These are:
 - i) The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - ii) Public safety;
 - iii) The prevention of public nuisance; and
 - iv) The protection of children from harm
- 4.3 Following consideration of the application, relevant representations and any comments of the licence holder, Members may take such steps as they consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 4.4 The steps are: -
 - To take no action;
 - To modify the conditions on the licence (this may include altering or omitting an existing condition or adding a new condition);
 - To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
 - To revoke the licence.

5. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

5.1 That Members consider the representations made by the Cleveland Police and the licence holder and determine what action, if any, should be taken.

ANNEX 1 – Mandatory Conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

- 2. (1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children-
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or

discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act):

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on-(i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

- 3. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that-
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures –
 (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and

(b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

ANNEX 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

1. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours includes:

New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

Permitted hours under this licence do not prohibit:

- (a) During the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of
- the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) During the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) During the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (d) Consumption of the alcohol on the premises or the taking of sale or supply of alcohol to any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (e) The ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) The sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) The sale or supply of alcohol, to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's navel, military or air forces;
- (h) The taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there; or
- (i) The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied; or
- (j) The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises
- 2. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:
 - (i) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence
 - (ii) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there
 - (iii) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from where there is no other convenient means of access or egress.

(iv) The bar is in the railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

No child under 16 years of age shall be admitted to any other part of the licensed premises unless accompanied by an adult

- 3. This licence is subject to such further conditions as are consistent with any restrictions imposed on the use of the premises for the existing licensable activities under the licence by virtue of the Children and Young Persons Act 1933.
- 4. Except with the prior written approval of the Licensing Authority and subject to any conditions which may be attached to such approval: -

(a) No special effects, naked flames, smoke production or any process creating a risk of fire, or the illusion of smoke or fire shall be used for the purpose of providing regulated entertainment on the premises.

(b) No explosives or highly flammable substances shall be brought into or used on the premises.

(c) No special effects shall be used or displays given on the premises, which consist of or include the use of lasers.

Applications for consent, giving detailed descriptions of the equipment to be used and details of the event, including dates and times must be made not less than 28 days before the date of the event.

- 5. There shall be maintained on the premises at all times an adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials for use by patrons.
- 6. The licensee must ensure that the electrical socket outlets in the licensed premises, which are used for the purpose of providing licensed entertainment are protected by a residual current device being a 30 MA tripping circuit
- 7. In the event of the fire alarm being activated a suitable relay must be provided so that the electrical power supply to all sound amplification system in the licensed premises must be immediately intercepted so that the alarm can be clearly heard in all parts of the licensed premises.

- 8. Before any dancing takes place in the premises suitable facilities shall be provided for dancing and details of the same shall be agreed with the local authority.
- 9. A drugs policy shall be prepared and implemented.

Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1) Cleveland Police make an application to review this premises licence for the following reasons:

The Loft has been a problem premises to Cleveland Police for some time and is continuing to cause concern. There was a transfer of Premises Licence Holder in May 2011 from Admiral Tavern to Ms Linda Baker.

Concerns have centred on violence, anti social behaviour, and drunk and disorderly persons associated with the premises.

Concerns were such that on 21st September 2011; a meeting was held between the Premises Licence Holder and DPS, Linda Baker, Sgt Wrigley and PC Hussain in order to discuss problems and how they could be addressed. At this meeting, Linda Baker agreed to an Action Plan suggested by Cleveland Police. Cleveland Police were of the opinion that the Action Plan would assist with preventing the licensing objectives being undermined. The Action Plan entailed, eg, CCTV, which must be made available to police on demand, two Door Supervisors on duty at core times and Challenge 21 Policy.

However, on 8th October 2011 at 03.25 hours, Inspector Haytack of Cleveland Police reported an incident whereby he noticed approximately 30 - 40 persons, who were clearly drunk, pushing and shoving to gain entry to the club. It was noted that there was only one Door Supervisor on duty, who was struggling to control the crowd. This was despite the agreed Action Plan some three and a half weeks earlier. Inspector Haytack spoke to Linda Baker regarding this incident.

On 29th October 2011, Inspector Haytack once again had issues with intoxicated persons leaving the premises on closing.

On 30th October 2011 at 01.20 hours, on no less than four occasions, Cleveland Police were called to the premises to deal with fights, which had broken out in the premises and spilled out onto the street. The situation was of such concern that Inspector Westmoreland and PC Hussain had to ask the premises to close voluntarily. This was necessary in the interests of public safety and had the premises not agreed, Cleveland Police would have had no alternative but to close the premises under Section 161 Licensing Act 2003.

It was noted on 30th October, that despite the agreed Action Plan, there was again, only one Door Supervisor on duty and, when CCTV footage was requested, Linda Baker admitted that she did not have any in the premises. It was further noted that Ms Baker was not happy at Cleveland Police asking her to close voluntarily and she appeared more concerned that this was her busy night and the time for her to make money. There appeared to be no understanding of the seriousness of the situation.

Cleveland Police believe due to the above concerns they have had no alternative but to make an application to review the premises licence as failure to do so may lead to persons being seriously injured. I am a Police Constable employed by Cleveland Police, currently posted in the Alcohol Licensing Unit in Hartlepool.

Part of my role is to monitor licensed premises within Hartlepool and ensure that they are not undermining the licensing objectives and abiding by the licensed conditions which have been attached to their licence. If premises are not abiding by the conditions imposed then it is my duty to collate evidence of the breaches and inform the licence holder of the issues.

A review has been initiated by Hartlepool Police in relation to The Loft Public House, which is situated on Church Street Hartlepool. Detailed below are offences and incidents which have been recorded by Hartlepool Police and caused particular concern in relation to The Loft Public House.

On the 1st May 2011 at 02:30 hours there was a disturbance outside The Loft Public House between two drunken males. Police attended the location and one officer placed himself

between the two males who were shouting abuse towards one another threatening violence. Whilst the police were trying to diffuse the situation one of the males has swore at the officer to move out of the way in order to allow him to assault the male he was arguing with. The officer declined to move and the male assaulted the officer with his clenched fist numerous times. The male responsible for the assault was arrested, and the second male involved was arrested for being drunk and disorderly.

On the 8th May 2011 at 03:13 hours police had cause to attend the loft Public House as they had received reports that there was a drunken female inside the premises who had passed out. Police attended the premises and found a female who was heavily under the influence of alcohol and who was in and out of consciousness, an ambulance was requested as there were concerns for the female's welfare due to her incapacitated condition. Paramedics assessed the females condition and deemed it necessary to take the female to Hartlepool General Hospital due to the amount of alcohol she had consumed.

On the 15th May 2011 at 03:10 hours police had cause to attend The Loft to a report of a disturbance. Upon arrival police were informed that 3 males had been inside the premises who were involved in an altercation with door staff. The 3 males were ejected from the premises by door staff and a member of door staff has been assaulted by the 3 males, the suspects were still in the vicinity of Church Street, who were located and arrested for assault. The member of door staff had sustained an injury to the centre of his forehead which was bleeding and a cut to his right ear.

The Loft had no CCTV to assist in apprehending offenders and to Prevent Crime and Disorder taking place inside the premises.

On the 21st May 2011 at 23:57 hours, Police received a report of a male who had been assaulted in The Loft Public House. Police attended and found a male who had a bloody nose, police were informed that the male had been stamped on which caused his bloody nose. The injured male was taken to hospital, and the suspect who was still in the vicinity was arrested on suspicion of assault.

On the 29th May 2011 at 03:52 hours Police have cause to speak to a male who has come out of The Loft Public House, the male is drunk and becomes abusive. The male is given a Section 27 Direction to leave notice to leave the town centre, this was to prevent any crime from been committed or further disorder.

On the 3rd July 2011 at 02:35 hours Police attended The Loft Public House to a report of a member of door staff being assaulted. Upon speaking with the member of door staff he informed police that he had allowed a male entry into the premises, but refused entry to a male accompanying him, due to this the male allowed entry without any warning has assaulted the doorman.

At the time the door man stated he was alone on the doorway of The Loft, the second doorman was inside the premises.

Subsequently the male responsible for assaulting the doorman was identified and arrested on suspicion of assault. This assault could have been avoided had there been 2 x doormen working on the front doors of The Loft Public House.

On the 14th August 2011 at 02:30 hours police were on patrol on Church Street, Hartlepool, as part of licensing patrols to reduce drink related violence and anti social behaviour in the area. At this time PC Crowe was stood outside The Loft Public House where he observed a known male through the large front glass window. The known male was stood inside The Loft and appeared to be drinking a pint of what appeared to be lager. Due to having previous dealings with the male, PC Crowe was aware that he had a Drink Banning Order which prohibits him from entering Church Street between the hours of 20:00 – 07:00. I exhibit this statement as YH/1

The Loft had been issued a photograph of the male by Hartlepool Licensing Unit to make the premises aware that he has a Drink Banning order and for them to be able to identify the male from the photograph provided.

On the 11th September 2011 at 03:15 hours police were on patrol on Church Street Hartlepool. At this time PC Busby was stood outside The Loft Public House when he observed a male leave the premises with a bloodied nose and a tooth missing. Upon speaking with the male he had confirmed that he had been assaulted inside The Loft but refused to co-operate with police or provide a statement to police. PC Busby attended The Loft and upon speaking with door staff PC Busby was informed that the premises doesn't have any CCTV. Due to there being no CCTV at the premises this crime could not be

investigated and this allowed the suspect to carry on without being bought to justice for an offence of assault. I exhibit this statement as YH/2

On the 18th September 2011 at 04:20 hours Inspector Haytack was on patrol on Church Street Hartlepool, in company with PC Hussain as part. All licensing premises had closed, however Inspector Haytack had observed a crowd of approximately 30 persons who had left The Loft were congregating outside the premises, all appeared to be under the influence of alcohol. Past experience has shown that allowing crowds to congregate can lead to incidents of disorder or alcohol related offences. To prevent any crime or disorder from occurring Inspector Haytack along with other police officers made efforts to disperse the crowds to nearby taxi rank, this took a significant amount of persuasion.

I exhibit this statement as YH/3

On the 21st September 2011 PC Hussain and Sgt Wrigley from Hartlepool Alcohol Licensing Unit had a meeting with Linda Baker premises licence holder. All the above incidents which had occurred were highlighted to Ms Baker. As an early intervention measure between the police and Ms Baker, it was agreed between both parties that the best way to tackle the issues around The Loft would voluntarily agree to an Action Plan because at the time the premise was undermining the licensing objectives, this was signed by Linda Baker and PC Hussain. The specified actions agreed were

 The premises should employ 2 x SIA accredited door staff on their entrances at core times. Door staff should be able to walk through the premises in order to identify barred and drunk persons and be able to deal with them more effectively. This would help bar

staff and management as it would reduce the risk of threats or assaults towards them as well as patrons inside the premises.

2) CCTV should be installed inside the premises, and will be provided in the form of a recordable system providing pictures of Evidential Quality in all lighting conditions particularly facial recognition.

Cameras shall compass all ingress and egress to the premises, fire exits and all areas where the sale/supply of alcohol occurs.

Equipment must be maintained in good working order, be correctly time and date stamped, recordings must be kept in date order, numbered sequentially and kept for a period of 31 days and handed to police on demand.

The premises licence holder must ensure at all times a DPS or appointed member of staff is capable and competent in at downloading CCTV footage in a recordable format Either Disc or VHS to the Police /Local Authority on demand.

The recording equipment and tapes/discs shall be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other responsible named individual.

An operational daily log report must be maintained endorsed by signature, indicating the system has been checked and is complaint, in the event of any failing's actions taken must be recorded.

3) The premise should keep an up to date refusals register which should be completed as accurately as possible. It should show details such as time and date of refusal, the name of the person refused and which staff refused them and a short explanation as to why. If they are unable to give a name for the person refused then a description of the person and their

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clothing should be given. I exhibit this as YH/4

On the 8th October 2011 at 03:25 hours Inspector Haytack was on patrol on Church Street, Hartlepool. At this time he noticed a crowd of approximately 30 – 40 persons gathered around the front entrance of the the Loft Public House. The majority of the people attempting to gain entry into the premises were drunk, at the time there was only one member of door staff on the entrance who was struggling to control the patrons.

Inspector Haytack spoke with the door man and requested to speak with the licensee of the premises, however the door man was unable to leave his post due to the fact he was on his own covering the doors to the premises, he managed to get a message to Linda Baker the licence holder, via his radio.

Inspector Haytack spoke to Ms Baker and expressed his concerns, to which Ms Baker stated that she was doing her best not allowing drunken persons onto the premises, and would deal with the issue. Police assisted in dispersing patrons from the locality, there was other premises that were still open, however The Loft was the only one having issues.

I exhibit this as YH/5

On the 13th October 2011 PC Hussain spoke to Linda Baker in relation to Inspector Haytack having to attend the premises when there was only one member of door staff on the main door. Ms Baker was advised that Inspector Haytack had concerns regarding a large crowd congregating outside the premises. Ms Baker stated that all the persons congregating outside the premises had left to go and have a smoke, and would then return inside the

premises until 04:00 hours, as her licence stipulates she can serve alcohol until 04:00 hours. Ms Baker was reminded of her obligations as a licensee and the necessity to have 2 door staff on the main doors at all times to support one another.

On 21st October 2011 PC Hussain spoke with Linda Baker, where she was reminded to ensure she had both of her door staff working on the front door of the premises to offer support to one another. Ms Baker was advised that The Loft does attract large groups, therefore, it is important to have both of her door man working on the doors for safety. She was further advised if there are any issues at the premises, she should report them to the police and they will deal with any reports.

On the 25th October 2011 PC Hussain again spoke with Ms Baker and asked if there had been any progress with CCTV being installed in the premises. Ms Baker stated that she was looking into the cost of how much CCTV would cost and would be able to give a definitive answer in the next week. This is despite agreeing to CCTV in a meeting some five weeks ago.

On 29th October 2011 at 03:45 hours, Inspector Haytack was on patrol on Church Street Hartlepool, as part of licensing patrols to reduce drink related violence and anti social behaviour in the area. At this time, he was stood near the Loft Public House and there was a group of approximately 30 persons congregating directly in front of the premises. The premises were in the process of closing, however he noticed that the majority of persons congregating outside The Loft had come from inside The Loft. The majority appeared to be

were all under the influence of alcohol, their speech was slurred and they were unsteady on their feet. Upon observing the group, it was clear that there was potential for public disorder and numerous arguments and scuffles were beginning to break out between the group outside the Loft. The crowd became abusive towards officers as they attempted to move the group on and the abuse continued towards officers during this process. Due to the disorder arrests were made for persons being drunk and disorderly and owing to their aggression, violent behaviour and resistance, they were handcuffed prior to being placed in police vans. Upon calming down one of the females arrested informed Inspector Haytack that she and others arrested had been in The Loft prior to their arrest. I exhibit this as YH/6.

On 30th October 2011 at 01:00 hours PC Haworth was on patrol in company with PC Malloy on Church Street Hartlepool. At this time, due to information received via CCTV that a bar was shouting for assistance due to fighting in progress, a female came out of The Loft and shouted at PC Haworth "GET IN THERE THEY ARE MURDERING EACH OTHER" The female pointed over towards the loft. PC Haworth had gone into the Loft in company with other officers, including PC Hussain from the Alcohol Licensing Unit, where they observed approximately 5 males pushing and shoving one another. At the time there was one door man on duty in the premises who was struggling with a male. PC Haworth made her way to the doorman to assist him as other males were pulling at him. The doorman then escorted a male out of the premises. PC Haworth noticed that the doorman was sweating and out of breath. Approximately 7 males were escorted out of the premises and two of the males had visible facial injuries. All males escorted outside were angry and were showing aggression towards others and to the police. A few moments later, the emergency exit door of The Loft

flew open and two males burst out and fell onto the ground followed by a bar stool! A number of females who had come out of The Loft informed PC Howarth that they had been frightened inside the premises. I exhibit this as YH/7

Due to the large scale disturbance, officers on Church Street were struggling to maintain order necessitating the despatch of further units to Church Street to assist.

Inspector Westmoreland attended Church Street as he was the Inspector responsible for the Night Time Economy. As inspector Westmoreland arrived, he observed numerous persons outside The Loft acting in a hostile and aggressive manner towards each other. He further observed a male being lead away from The Loft by police who was under arrest, the male was unsteady on his feet speech slurred, and he was being aggressive towards officers and shouting and swearing.

Sgt Galloway who was present, informed Inspector Westmoreland that the disorder was related to The Loft. There was further disorder outside the front of the Loft, several fights were occurring near to the front of the Loft, numerous individual were shouting threats towards each other and acting in a hostile manner. In it's totality this was an ugly incident with the potential for serious injury and further disorder. Sgt Galloway further informed Inspector Westmoreland that there had been further disorder in and around the vicinity of The Loft. Inspector Westmoreland spoke with the door supervisor who was sweating heavily and short of breath. He informed Inspector Westmoreland that he was the only door supervisor on duty at The Loft.

Inspector Westmoreland requested to speak with Linda Baker which the door supervisor arranged, although Linda Bake was not on the premises at the time the fighting and disorder occurred. Whilst waiting for Ms baker, Inspector Westmoreland asked the door supervisor if the Linda Baker would consider closing the premises voluntarily, to which he stated he had already informed her of this and that there had been trouble at the premises earlier in the evening.

Inspector Westmoreland entered the premises and spoke with Ms Baker when she arrived and informed her of all the disorder and fighting associated with the premises, the premises having no CCTV and only one door supervisor. he pointed out if the premises remained open, this would be to the detriment of public safety.

Linda Baker was asked if she would consider a voluntarily closure of the premises, Ms Bakers initial reaction was the financial implications of closing early would be severe. Inspector Westmoreland reiterated the issues around public safety, at which point Ms Baker agreed to a voluntarily closure. Inspector Westmoreland informed PC Hussain that Ms Baker had agreed to a voluntarily closure, and requested PC Hussain speak with Ms Baker.I exhibit this as YH/8

I attended The Loft in company with PC Haworth and PC Molloy. Whilst Ms Baker was on the phone to Kevin Jackson who provides security for The Loft, she informed Mr Jackson that police had closed the premises.

I informed Ms Baker the reason for closing the premises was due to the fighting and disorder from the premises, at this point Ms Baker stated that there had only been one fight in the premises. However a member of staff stated that 4 fights had occurred inside the premises, I

advised Ms Baker that there was still no CCTV inside the premises and due to the frequency of incidents public safety was at risk, therefore the decision was made to close the premises.

It appears that the management of The Loft are willing to promote commercial considerations above the safety of their customers and their staff. The lack of door staff is a contributory factor in that there are sufficient safeguards on the door to prevent wholly inappropriate individuals entry to the premises. The paucity of door staff also means that in the event of trouble the one door supervisor is quickly overwhelmed and effectively rendered helpless. Furthermore their inability to ensure that the premises has a fully functioning and fully operational CCTV system further aggravates the situation in that no deterrent is available and subsequently police enquiries are frustrated.

This is clear breach of the licensing objectives as public safety is definitely not being promoted or implemented inside the premise, neither is the prevention of crime and disorder which is evident in this statement. There have been numerous assaults in the past few months within the premises; the premises had to be closed recently to promote public safety due to the disorder which occurred within the premises.

It is the belief of Cleveland Police that despite an Action Plan to recover the current state of the premises, there has been no appreciable improvement and measures which should have been implemented have not been. This indicates a casual approach to the Licensing Objectives and an almost wilful disregard of the measures necessary to restore good management and safety to the Loft. This being so, there is no alternative to Review

I am a Police Constable for Cleveland Police and I am currently stationed at Hartlepool Police Station.

At approximately 0230 hours on Sunday 14th August 2011, I was on duty in full Police uniform with PC 2352 WALLACE on foot patrol outside of THE LOFT on CHURCH STREET, HARTLEPOOL.

I would describe THE LOFT as a busy licensed premise which is situation in the centre of CHURCH STREET opposite other licensed premise such as DECADES and NEXUS NIGHT CLUB.

I would describe CHURCH STREET, as a public place consisting of residential housing and various licensed premises and other small business premises. Furthermore CHURCH STREET has a single carriageway running directly through the centre. This carriageway runs from MAINSFORTH TERRACE, HARTLEPOOL to TOWER STREET, HARTLEPOOL.

Whilst stood directly outside THE LOFT on the pedestrian pathway, I saw a male I know to be

I have dealt with the reason I immediately recognised him.

Due to me having previous knowledge of **Constant is** I know that he has an active drinking banner order which prohibits him from entering numerous streets in HARTLEPOOL town centre, including CHURCH STREET between the hours of 2000 hours and 0700 hours.

As a result of this information both I and SGT 974 DAWBER entered the premise and walked to end of the bar located on the ground floor. At this point, I saw stood with another unknown male attempting to order more drinks. I therefore intervened and escorted **matters** outside of the premise so that I could discuss the matter further.

Once outside I formally arrested and cautioned for breaching his Drinking Banning Order to which he made no reply.

Once this time has elapsed it is very important for those using the premises to disperse from outside. The reason for that is if crowds are allowed to congregate, in my experience, this can lead to incidents of disorder or the commission of alcohol related offences.

At the time stated above I was aware that a crowd of about 30 persons were hanging round on the pavement directly outside the front of The Loft. I noticed that The Loft was closed with no staff around. I had noticed that these persons had left the loft when it closed, and all appeared to be under the influence of alcohol.

Evidence; (details of evidence from reported crimes, incidents etc...)

The Loft is an on-licensed premise on Church Street, Hartlepool. Between April 2011 and September 2011 there have been a total of 13 incidents and 5 offences reported at the above premises.

The incidents/offences include the following:

Violence, dispersals of large groups, anti social behaviour, drunk & disorderly persons in the premises who have Drink Banning Orders. Concerns for the safety of patrons who have come from inside The Loft and have been under the influence causing Anti Social Behaviour. There have been assaults which have occurred inside the premises, and issues with groups of males and door staff.

There was an incident where door staff had been assaulted by a reveller, whilst door staff was seeking treatment this left the entrance/exit to the premises unmanned leaving patrons who are barred enter the premises, also allowing revellers to leave the premises with bottles and glasses. This could have been prevented had there been 2 x door staff. The premise seems to suffer from persons having Anti-social Behaviour orders and barred persons attending the premises. There have also been reports of threats towards staff, which may be attributable to the undesirable element who are finding their way in.

However over the last few weeks there has been improvement with The Loft, hopefully this will continue.

Cleveland Police considers the current state of the above premises to be undermining the four licensing objectives and of an unacceptable level. By working in partnership, Cleveland Police would like to resolve the issues of crime and antisocial behaviour at the above premises by signing the below agreement of specified actions.

This is a voluntary agreement and is to be considered as an early intervention by Cleveland Police in order to avoid a potential review of the premises licence.

I am an Inspector in Cleveland Police, currently stationed at Hartlepool on V relief response.

At 3:45 on the morning of Saturday the 29th of October 2011 I was on duty on uniform foot patrol in the Church Street area of Hartlepool. My main role at this time is to monitor and deal with any issues that arise as a result of the Night Time economy.

At this time I was stood near to the licensed premises known as "The Loft", which has a licence to stop serving and close at 4am that morning. I noticed that there was a group of about 30 persons who were congregating directly in front of the main entrance to the premises. It was clear that the premises were in the process of emptying and I noticed that the majority of this group had come from within, and were clearly under the influence of alcohol. Their speech was slurred, and they were unsteady on their feet.

After observing this group it appeared to me that there was a potential for public disorder, several arguments and minor scuffles were beginning to break out between the persons outside of The Loft.

My initial response was to utilise officers from my team to attempt to move the persons on, and disperse them towards the taxi rank further up Church Street.

This was met with abuse from one or two members of the group. The abuse continued from these persons despite several warnings from the officers involved. Due to the continued disorder from these people, arrests had to be made for offences of being drunk and disorderly. In total 4 individuals had to be arrested and due to their aggression, resistance and violent behaviour, all had to be handcuffed, before being taken away in Police vans.

I am a police constable with CLEVELAND police currently stationed in HARTLEPOOL, within Z relief, the response policing unit.

At about 01.00hrs on Sunday 30th October 2011 I was in full Police uniform at in company with my colleague also in full police uniform PC 2242 Molloy, it was at this time we wee on high visibility licensing patrol on Church Street, Hartlepool when CCTV communicated that a bar was shouting for assistance due to fighting. It was at this time a female came out of The Loft on Church Street and shouted over to me "GET IN THERE THEY ARE MURDERING EACH OTHER", she pointed over to the door of The Loft. My colleague and I then ran over and went into bar. Upon first sight the bar was very crowded, the area of the bar is relatively small, roughly 40ft long by 20ft. I could see unknown males shouting and pushing against one another, about 5 males in a group near to the bar, I could see the door staff a Paul Williams struggling with a male, I immediately went over to assist him as other males were pulling at Williams to let go of a male. Williams then walked a male out, I could see him visibly sweating and out of breath. PC Molloy and I escorted about 7 males out, two of which had visible facial injuries. All males that were escorted outside were extremely angry and had

been showing aggression to others. I then went outside where the same males were shouting. At this point there were many persons outside and Police struggling to disperse. It was moments later the emergency exit door flew open and two males burst out and fell onto the ground followed by a bar stool. I then saw another quickly close the exit door. These males were dealt with. I stayed outside The Loft dispersing people, a number of females approached me stating that they had been frightened inside The Loft when the fighting was occurring. A short time after the Inspector requested help closing The Loft and clearing the occupants. This was done effectively. I was then asked to accompany PC 2086 Hussain while to speaks with the DPS of The Loft. Whilst inside The Loft, with PC Molloy, Williams, a member of bar staff, PC Hussain and the female DPS. The member of bar staff stated that there had been 4 separate fights within the bar and that Williams was struggling to stop it. He stated that it had started with two females fighting, and implied that the following fights were a result of the females fighting. PC Hussain discussed with the DPS the importance of preventing crime and disorder relating to public houses and alcohol.

As I was making my way towards this location Sergeant 132 GALLOWAY requested that CCTV monitored THE LOFT PUBLIC HOUSE.

Almost immediately after making this request, Sergeant 132 GALLOWAY requested all Police Units to CHURCH STREET.

Upon arrival at CHURCH STREET at approximately 01:28 I parked my vehicle on CHURCH STREET in between the junctions of STATION APPROACH and WHITBY STREET. I immediately alighted my Police Vehicle and started to make my way down towards THE LOFT where there appeared to be numerous persons outside the premises acting in a hostile and aggressive manner towards each other.

At this point I observed two Police Officers leading a male under arrest away from THE LOFT. I then made my way back to the Police Van and unlocked the rear doors which enabled this male to be placed in the rear cage. This male was unsteady on his feet, his eyes were intoxicated and his speech was slurred. He was also aggressive towards officers and was shouting and swearing.

Sergeant 132 GALLOWAY made his way towards my location and indicated that there was disorder occurring relating to THE LOFT.

At this time there was further disorder outside the front of THE LOFT, and Sergeant 132 GALLOWAY made his way back towards that location.

At this time I remained with the Police van as there was a prisoner in the rear of the van. At this time I observed several fights on CHURCH STREET. There was disorder near to the front of THE LOFT with several individuals appearing to shout threats at each other and acting in a hostile manner.

Sgt 132 GALLOWAY made his was back to my location after approximately 5 minutes. He again indicated that there had been disorder in and around the vicinity of THE LOFT.

I made my way to the front of THE LOFT. At the entrance to THE LOFT I spoke with a Door Supervisor. I now know this male to be Paul WILLIAMS. WILLIAMS was sweating heavily and appeared short of breath. WILLIAMS was the only door supervisor at this location. I requested that WILLIAMS got the Designated Premises Supervisor to make their way to my location. WILLIAMS arranged this.

I asked WILLIAMS if he was ok and he confirmed that he was. I asked him if the Designated Premises Supervisor would consider voluntarily closing the premises as it appeared there was disorder occurring in relation to the premises.

WILLIAMS stated to me that he had already informed the Designated Premises Supervisor of this fact as there had been trouble on the premises earlier in the evening.

After approximately 5 minutes I entered the premises and spoke with the Designated Premises Supervisor who identified herself as Linda BAKER. I informed BAKER that the staff at her premises had already requested assistance tonight due to a fight, and that there had been disorder on CHURCH STREET, including fighting, which had been due to persons who had left THE LOFT.

I also informed BAKER that I had been informed there had been disorder on the premises earlier that evening. BAKER indicated that she thought there had been only one fight. I asked BAKER if the premises had any CCTV, and she confirmed that it did not. I explained that as there had been disorder both inside and outside the premises related to THE LOFT, and there was no CCTV and only one member of door staff, then if the premises remained open it may be to the detriment of public safety.

Due to the above considerations, I requested BAKER to consider voluntarily closing the premises. The initial reaction of BAKER was in relation to the financial implications of closing early. I again reiterated the issues around public safety, at which point BAKER was cooperative and stated she would close voluntarily. I thanked BAKER for her co-operation. BAKER then asked if this would this be looked upon favourably by the Licensing Department. I informed BAKER that I could not comment on this matter as I was not in the Licensing Department, however it would show that she had cooperated with the Police. I also informed her that they had a duty to promote the licensing objectives.

Police Officers then assisted staff with clearing THE LOFT of the remaining customers.

I then spoke with PC HUSSAIN, who works as part of The HARTLEPOOL DISTRICT LICENSING UNIT, and informed her that BAKER had been cooperative and had agreed to close the premises voluntarily. I requested that PC 2086 HUSSAIN spoke with BAKER in relation to the licensing objectives.

I spoke with PC 2086 HUSSAIN after she had spoken with BAKER, and PC HUSSAIN confirmed that staff at THE LOFT had informed her that there had been 4 fights in the premises earlier in the evening prior to staff requesting Police assistance.

I am a Police Constable employed by Cleveland Police, currently posted in the Alcohol Licensing Unit in Hartlepool.

In relation to the statement I submitted on 2nd November regarding The Loft Public House, situated on Church Street, Hartlepool, I would like to add the following:

On Saturday 24th December 2011 at 03:49 hours, there was a disturbance outside The Loft Public house between a drunken male who was arguing with door staff Paul Williams. I attended in company with PC 810 Smith and spoke with the drunken male who informed me he had come out of The Loft to have a cigarette and was not allowed entry back into the premises. I informed him that the management had the right to refuse entry and the premises would be closing shortly. The male became very abusive and had to be warned regarding his language on numerous occasions prior to him leaving the vicinity.

On the same morning, my attention was drawn to a female who I witnessed walking out of

The Loft Public House. She had hold of a pint glass of alcohol and as I approached the female, I could clearly tell that she was underage. When I spoke with the female, she furnished me with her personal details and when I conducted checks, it was ascertained the female was only 17 years of age. I asked the female if she had been asked to produce any identification on entering licensed premises to which she informed me that no identification had been requested from her.

On Monday 27th December 2011 at 02:50 hours, there was a disturbance outside The Loft between 2 drunken females. I approached one of the females, who had a facial injury. The female informed me that she had been involved in a disturbance inside The Loft with another female and this has how she has received her facial injury. This was documented in my PNB which was signed by the female.
