Following the welcome and introductions, the Chair confirmed Residents had not received the agenda for the meeting and confirmed for future meetings, all residents who had attended previous meetings would be notified of future forums

### 7. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME AND WARD ISSUES

The Chair announced that questions would be asked and ward issues would be raised by Residents first and Councillors second.

## Manor House

A Resident spoke of actions which had arisen from the Rift House Tenants Association regarding the speed restrictions at Masefield Road and a grass verge on the bend at Kipling Road. Councillor Marjorie James confirmed she was happy to discuss this further with the Resident after the Forum.

## Foggy Furze

A Resident raised issues with regards to the new build estate. The street lights were on day and night; this had been reported on numerous occasions. The Neighbourhood Manager confirmed she had reported this to the Public Lighting Manager and would chase it up. Dog fouling in the area had increased and the road surface required attention. Councillor Ray Wells highlighted that he had previously suggested all Elected Members should have the authority to issue fixed penalty notices for dog fouling and that no additional costs would apply to the Council as Elected Members already had a valid CRB. The Assistant **Director of Neighbourhood Services** confirmed she would investigate if this was feasible with the Councils Legal Department.

## **Rural West**

A Resident reported that the road from Elwick Road to Wooler Road was in serious need of repair and that leaving cut grass was dangerous for elderly people. The Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services confirmed that

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2012 had seen the wettest April to June on record and that resources did not allow grass to be collected after being cut.

## **Rossmere and Fens**

A Resident raised concerns regarding speeding on Rossmere Way and had already requested a speeding sign. It was confirmed Police had been out to monitor, however it was the incorrect time day. Councillor Alison Lilley confirmed she had attended meetings with Officers in order to try and resolve the speeding issues. The Chair suggested that the speeding issue could be linked with Community Speed Watch. The Resident also commented on the poor state of the pond, due to overgrown weeds and questioned whether the Lottery Grant received could be used to address this. The Chair confirmed this was noted by the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services, who would provide a response.

## Manor House

Councillor Marjorie James confirmed grass cuttings issues were ongoing and had led to a Resident falling, however, the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services and the Neighbourhood Manager were working hard to try and resolve. Councillor Marjorie James also questioned when the CCTV review would be concluded and how soon could the traffic issues at Patrick shops would be dealt with. The Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services confirmed that this issued had recently been approved by the Portfolio Holder, survey's had been completed within the area and that information would hopefully be available the following month.

## Foggy Furze

Councillor Christopher Akers-Belcher raised concerns with reference to the five

year road improvement plan, as mistakes had been identified and Swalebrooke Avenue and Taybrooke Avenue had not been reflected. It was requested that PCSO's patrol the area more often in order for anti-social behaviour to be monitored. Confirmation was requested regarding the 'like for like' fencing around Waverley Terrace.

Councillor Kaylee Sirs invited residents to attend the drop in surgery at Browning Avenue Baptist Church in between 5.00 pm and 6.00 pm that evening.

## **Rural West**

Councillor Ray Wells reported that the Traffic Camera at Sappers Corner, Greatham wasn't working and urged for it to be fixed. An illuminated warning sign was requested for the blind bend and crossing on Elwick Road.

Councillor Brenda Loynes highlighted bushes at a house in Springston Road were dangerously high causing vision to be blocked when travelling in a car. An update was requested on the Lodge Gates. The Senior Neighbourhood Coordinator confirmed that discussions were currently taking place with Conservation Officers, as the cost of original gates was over £2,500.00. Councillor Brenda Loynes suggested a meeting should take place to discuss further.

## **Burn Valley**

Councillor Ged Hall raised queries regarding dog fouling and private landlords and was keen for progress reports on selective licensing to be presented at future Regeneration and Planning services Scrutiny Forum. Objections had also been raised with reference to the one way system on Arncliffe Gardens and Wansbeck Gardens. Councillor Brash highlighted that Clifton Avenue and Hutton Avenue were now 20 mph zones and indicated, although 20 mph zones worked well outside of schools, it was important for the community to be in agreement to avoid a community split.

## Victoria

Councillor Chris Simmons confirmed that Elected Members had been working with the Neighbourhood Team, Residents and Police in order to resolve problems within Victoria and expressed his gratitude.

Councillor Carl Richardson raised concerns regarding grass cutting and the danger uncollected grass imposed to elderly residents within the ward and suggested that cut grass be sold for compost. The Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services confirmed that resources prevented grass from being collected across the town. The Council collected grass in some areas e.g. sheltered accommodation and strategic routes / roundabouts. The Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services also advised that compost was provided to the public free of charge as part of the Councils recycling campaign. The Chair added that he had witnessed grass blowers being used in order to remove grass from pavements.

## Rossmere and Fens

Councillor Alison Lilley raised concern regarding speeding bikes, riding on pavements near Fens School on Spalding Road. Thanks were also given to Officers for their assistance with dog fouling issues.

Councillor Steve Gibbon raised concerns regarding PCSO's having to leave wards earlier in order to walk back to the York Road base for 10.00 pm. Inspector Halliday confirmed that statistics for Antisocial behaviour around Fens shops had reduced from 37 calls in March to 6 calls in May. It was highlighted if trends increased work shifts could be looked at to accommodate.

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Councillor Geoff Lilley reported that residents were alarmed by the number off road bikes speeding on Catcote Road and on Fens school field.

residents. It was confirmed by the Community Regeneration and Development Co-ordinator that copies would be brought to the next 'special' Neighbourhood Forum on 19 July 2012.

A Resident raised concerns regarding the publicity of the Forums, the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services confirmed that press releases, Resident Associations, public notices, internet, Facebook, Twitter and local radio stations had been utilised, in order to raise Resident awareness of the Neighbourhood Forums.

Councillor Marjorie James confirmed that many different issues would be raised at Scrutiny Forums throughout the year and urged Residents to attend and contribute.

### 11. NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING UPDATE

Inspector Dave Halliday provided a verbal overview on the South and Central Neighbourhood Policing staff, new ward boundaries and reduction in crime. Inspector Halliday was keen to pick up new ideas from new wards and commented on the great community sprit and the communication between Councillors and the Neighbourhood Policing team. Inspector Halliday confirmed that the Government funded, Community Speed Watch would assist with speeding problems within his wards and although it was in the early stages, the key was having regular dialogue with both Residents and Partnerships. Inspector Halliday had already carried out work in various areas and confirmed that Rossmere Way was next.

Residents praised the work of the PCSO's and Councillor Angie Wilcox confirmed she was in contact with the PCSO's in Manor House Ward on a daily basis and also praised their work.

Councillor Marjorie James highlighted that violent crime had increased and suggested that a campaign to raise awareness could be beneficial for the community, especially vulnerable groups who were not aware they could be inviting crime.

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Stephen Akers-Belcher, Jonathan Brash, Ged Hall, Pamela Hargreaves, Chris Simmons and Kaylee Sirs.

### 15. REFERENDUM ON HOW THE **COUNCIL IS RUN**

The Chief Solicitor gave a detailed and comprehensive presentation which set the scene and enabled examination of the options available in a referendum on how the Council was run. It was noted that this meeting was part of a fuller consultation process, the outcome of which would be reported to Council on 2 August 2012. The current system and alternative option would the be considered in a referendum to be held on 15 November 2012.

In conclusion it was noted that the options available for a referendum were:

## Ballot Paper No. 1:

How would you like Hartlepool Borough Council to be run?

By a Mayor who is elected by voters. This was how the Council was run now.

By a Leader who is an elected Councillor chosen by a vote of the other elected This would be a change Councillors. from how the Council was run now.

### Ballot Paper No. 2:

How would you like Hartlepool Borough Council to be run?

By a Mayor who is elected by voters. This was how the Council was run now.

By one or more committees made up of elected Councillors. This would be a change from how the Council was run now.

Several members of the public were in attendance and addressed the Forum.

A resident sought clarification on how the referendum would be facilitated. The

Chief Solicitor confirmed that the ballot on the governance arrangements for the Council would be held in conjunction with the election for the Police and Crime Commissioner on 15 November 2012. This would mean that everyone eligible to vote would be able to do so.

A resident raised concerns at the low attendance of the public and questioned how the meeting had been promoted. The Assistant Director, Neighbourhood Services acknowledged that whilst timescales were tight, the meetings had been advertised in the usual way as well as the addition of several press releases in the local paper. Residents could also respond to the consultation via an online survey on the Council's website.

Clarification was sought on the financial accountability of the different governance options. The Chief Solicitor confirmed that the Council was a statutory corporate body and was therefore financially accountable in its own right, although Officers could Members and be individually responsible if they operated outside the confines of legislation.

A resident questioned the financial implications of the different governance options. The Assistant Director. Neighbourhood Services indicated that the financial implications and proposed structures will be examined further once the referendum options had been identified.

However, a Member commented that in approximate figures, a Mayoral allowance including on-costs would be approximately £100k with additional special responsibility allowances paid to the Chairs of the regulatory committees and overview and scrutiny committees. Taking this into account, it was this Members opinion that a committee system was unlikely to result in a higher cost to the authority with a saving of at least the Mayoral allowance being made.

A resident questioned how many of the initial elected Mayor's were still in position. The Chief Solicitor confirmed that there were originally 11 elected Mayors and a further 5 had been elected. It was noted that there had been 47 referendums held since 2001.

In response to a question from a resident, a number of Members confirmed that they did feel that the elected Mayoral governance system had eroded the role of the local councillor and devalued local democracy.

Clarification was sought on whether overview and scrutiny would form part of a committee system. A Member clarified that there would continue to be an element of scrutiny including statutory obligations for overview and scrutiny in relation to the Police and Crime Panel as well as the Health and Wellbeing Board.

A Member emphasised the importance of ensuring that the governance arrangements in place were in the best interests of the residents of the Town.

The Assistant Director, Neighbourhood Services confirmed that the referendum options would be considered and agreed at a meeting of Council on 2 August 2012 at 7.00pm in the Council Chamber and members of the public were encouraged to attend.

It was highlighted that the deadline for responses to the consultation was 20 July 2012 to enable checking against the electoral register and a report to be compiled for the Council meeting on 2 August 2012.

## **Economic Regeneration Strategy**

- The Economic Regeneration Team is responsible for driving forward the ERS (2011-2021) which provides a shared ambition of moving the Borough towards a more inclusive and prosperous economy.
- The ERS vision is: Hartlepool will achieve its ambition of sustained, economic prosperity through major regeneration, driving business growth, increasing innovation, developing entrepreneurship and skills to make the area an attractive location to live, invest, work and visit.
- The ERS aim is: 'Develop a more enterprising, vigorous and diverse local economy that will attract new investment, enable local enterprises and entrepreneurs to be globally competitive and create more employment opportunities for local people'.



## **Economic Regeneration Strategy**

The ERS has 5 main objectives:

- To improve business growth and business infrastructure and enhance a culture of entrepreneurship
- To attract new investment and develop major programmes to regenerate the area and improve connectivity
- To increase employment and skills levels and develop a competitive workforce that meets the demands of employers and the economy
- To increase the economic inclusion of adults, tackle financial exclusion and reduce the proportion of children in poverty
- To boost the visitor economy



## **ERS and Links to JSNA**

The ERS contributes to a number of cross-cutting themes including improving the Health and Well-being of residents.

- The DWP report, 'Caring for our Future' (2004) found that long term unemployed or economically inactive adults are nearly twice as likely (30%) to have a mental health problem as those employed (16%).
- According to the Freud Report (2007) it was stated that worklessness is strongly associated with poor health, including higher mortality, poorer mental health and higher usage of medical services.
- The Freud Report (2007) also stated clearly that claimants moving off benefits into work; experience improvements in their income, socioeconomic status, mental and general health, and well-being.



# What are the Key Issues? (1)

- GB has witnessed worst recession in living memory.
- Lack of public and private investment on major regeneration programmes.
- Insufficient levels of business stock and business start ups.



# What are the Key Issues? (2)

- Youth Unemployment remains high.
- Long term unemployed adults and young people not prepared for the world of work.
- Local labour market does not meet the demands of SMEs.



# Who is at Risk and Why? (1)

- All businesses are potentially at risk unless the economy starts to grow. In particular those involved with the retail, leisure and tourism sector. This is due to reduced consumer confidence and spending.
- New start-up businesses, particularly within the first 12 months of trading.
- Urgent investment needed through large scale regeneration programmes that can provide opportunities for local businesses.
- Access to skilled workers, particularly to meet future needs of SMEs.



# Who is at Risk and Why? (2)

- The long term unemployed claiming key benefits who may feel socially excluded.
- Unemployed adults with long term limiting illnesses.
- Those adults aged 50+ who have recently been made redundant or are due to be made redundant.
- Young people who have little or no work experience.
- Adults with low educational attainment.
- Those returning to the labour market including lone parents.
- Those adults with health problems and/or disabilities.
- Those with caring responsibilities.

## **Regional Growth Fund**

 £1.4bn fund introduced by Government to support projects and programmes that lever private sector investment to create economic growth and sustainable employment.



- Within Hartlepool, five companies were successful in securing funding including Able Seaton Dock, Heerema, Huntsman Tioxide, PD Ports and J&B Recycling which will safeguard existing jobs and create new jobs.
- Hartlepool secured 55% of the RGF funding allocation across the Tees Valley.



## **Enterprise Zones**

- The Government announced in the 2011 budget that it would establish 21 new Enterprise Zones in LEP areas. The Tees Valley LEP was amongst the first 11 LEPs that were identified.
- EZ are a key part of the Government's pro-growth agenda that allows areas with real potential to create new businesses and jobs.
- The core offer for businesses is around business rates discounts, enhanced capital allowances and a simplified planning regime.



### **Local environmental priorities**

- Priorities identified
  - -Climate change
  - -Air and water pollution
  - -Noise
  - -cleanliness



#### Climate

- Hotter, drier summers, milder, wetter winters
- Increased incidence and severity of storm events
- The greatest impact is on the most vulnerable members of society
  - Elderly & infirm
  - Disabled people and children
  - Those on low incomes who are unable to afford measures to make themselves and their properties more resilient to changing climates



#### Noise

- We continue to receive complaints regarding noise issues emanating from
  - Music & Parties
  - Barking dogs
  - Alarms
  - Commercial premises pubs/ clubs and waste sites



### **Air & Water Quality**

- There is a perception that air quality in Hartlepool is poor although the air quality is well within statutory limits and there are no requirements to declare any air quality management areas
- Exposure to second hand smoke impacts on health, causing a range of symptoms from eye irritation, headache, cough, sore throat, to heart and lung cancer
- Water quality can affect public health, it is essential that drinking water is clean and bathing water in swimming pools and along our coastline is safe



#### Cleanliness

- Ward Profile recurrent themes include:
  - Improve the general appearance of the area, and promote safer, cleaner and greener streets.
  - Improve levels of environmental management including addressing derelict land and buildings.
  - Develop, improve and maintain local green spaces, parks and recreational areas.
  - Improve the maintenance of local shopping parades.



Initially all three beaches failed to meet the bathing water standards. This was because sewage from Hartlepool and surrounding areas was discharged without effective treatment via a short outfall. In the early 1990s, Northumbrian Water constructed a scheme to address this which involved interception of existing outfalls and discharge via a long outfall. Also new sewage treatment works was built at Seaton Carew in 2000 In 1994 all bathing beaches meet the basic standards and in 1995 Seaton Carew Centre and North Gare both passed guideline standards for the first time.

Hartlepool Borough Council has established a group which will work with the Environment Agency and Northumbrian Water, focusing to making further improvements to bathing water quality in the future


