17 October 2012

24. Apologies for Absence

An apology for absence was submitted on behalf of Councillor Tempest.

30. Scrutiny Investigation into the JSNA Topic of Environment – Climate Change – Covering Report/Presentation (Scrutiny Support Officer/Climate Change Officer)

As part of the Forum's investigation into the JSNA topic of Environment, officers from the Waste and Environmental Management Team had been invited to attend the meeting to provide evidence in relation to the climate change element of the investigation.

The Climate Change Officer provided a detailed and comprehensive presentation which focussed on the key issues, risks, level of need, services currently provided and projected level of need in relation to climate change and included:-

- Definition of Climate Change What is it?
- What do People Think?
 - 98% of people are aware of climate change
 - 75% know a great deal or fair amount about it.
- Global Warming
- Global Average Temperature
- Effects of Climate Change
 - hotter, drier summers
 - milder, wetter winters
 - increase in severity and frequency of severs weather events
 - rising sea levels
- Impacts on Vulnerable People
 - heat/sun, flooding, storms
- What is Being Done
 - Education on and awareness raising programme
 - Range of carbon/energy reduction projects
 - Compilation of carbon footprint
 - Town wide intervention, promotion of energy efficiency measures
- Progress to Date
 - carbon reduction of 4.7% in past year for the Council's own estate
 - carbon reduction of 14% since 2005 for the whole borough against a target of 20% by 2020 $\,$

Discussion ensued which included the following issues:-

- (i) In relation to the carbon energy reduction projects, clarification was provided in response to a number of queries raised by members of the public in relation to voltage optimisation and electric vehicles
- (ii) A query was raised regarding future lighting improvements to which the Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services advised that a number of models were being explored and would be presented for consideration in due course.
- (iii) A Member sought clarification on the approximate saving to the Council as a result of the introduction of electric vehicles for Council related business. The Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services indicated that significant savings had been achieved, a breakdown of which would be provided following the meeting.
- (iv) In response to a query as to whether the carbon emissions targets were achievable, Members were advised that there had been a carbon reduction of 4.7% in the past year for the Council's own estate, against an aspirational target of 7%. The 7% target was currently being reviewed and would be replaced by a more achievable target by the end of the financial year. Carbon reduction for the entire town currently stands at 14% since 2005, against a target of 20% by 2020.
- (v) The Climate Change Officer outlined the process and benefits of the Collective Energy Switching Scheme in response to a number of queries raised by the Forum. Members commented on the need to publicise the scheme to residents acknowledging the continuing increase in fuel poverty in the town. The Assistant Director provided details of the options currently being explored regarding collective switching and to raise awareness regarding fuel poverty
- (vi) The Forum discussed renewable energy issues, the proposal to introduce wind turbines at Brenda Road and the potential benefits as a result. Members suggested that the use of solar panel water heaters on Council Buildings was investigated. The Forum also suggested that the least energy efficient Council buildings should be considered for disposal first.

Following the conclusion of the question and answer session, the Climate Change Officer provided an update on progress made to date on the delivery of the agreed scrutiny recommendations against the Neighbourhood Services Scrutiny Investigation into climate change and carbon management undertaken in 2009/2010.

The various measures and initiatives that had been introduced or explored to help reduce energy costs were discussed including the benefits of solar panels and renewable heat incentives.

Recommended

That the information given be noted and discussions be used to assist the Forum in completing the scrutiny investigation.

31. Information from the Health Protection Agency (Scrutiny Support Officer)

The Scrutiny Support Officer referred Members to extracts of information from the Health Protection Agency in relation to the climate change element of the investigation, as detailed in the report. It was reported that as health colleagues had been unable to attend the meeting, any queries arising from the information provided could be co-ordinated via the Scrutiny Support Officer.

Recommended

That the information contained within the report, be noted.

32. The Executive's Forward Plan

The Executive's Forward Plan for October to January 2013 relating to the Neighbourhood Services Scrutiny Forum was provided to give Members of the Forum the opportunity to consider whether any items within the Plan should be considered by this Forum.

In relation to Forward Plan Reference Number RN74/11 – Former Leather Chemical Site, in response to a request for clarification, the Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services advised that a report had been considered by Cabinet in early October which identified which sites were contaminated. Two were deemed to be safe, however, the remaining site required further investigation. It had been agreed that the one site be further explored, the outcome of which would be reported to Cabinet in January. The forward plan had since been updated to reflect this decision.

With regard to Forward Plan Reference Number RN 18/12 – Leasing of Land to a Wind Turbine Developer for the Erection of Wind Turbines on Land at Brenda Road and the suggestion that the arrangement would lead to an annual fixed price income, in response to a query as to the level of such income, the Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services indicated that this information would not be available until the completion of the tendering process. A number of queries were raised in relation to the proposed development to which the Assistant Director for Neighbourhood Services provided clarification. The Forum suggested that any income received should be split between the Community Benefit Fund and the Invest to Save Scheme.

In relation to Forward Plan Reference Number RN24/12 – Additional Highway Maintenance Works 2012-13 and in response to a request for clarification, the Forum was advised of the process for determining which maintenance works should be undertaken.

Recommended

That the comments of the Forum be noted and reflected in the Forward Plan where necessary.

It was reported that the next meeting would be held on 14 November at 1.00 pm to consider the budget.

- INITIAL CONSULTATION PROPOSALS

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To provide the opportunity, as part of the consultation process in relation to the development of the Council's Medium Term Financial Strategy (MTFS) for 2013/14 to 2016/17, for the Neighbourhood Services Scrutiny Forum to consider initial proposals in relation to those service areas of the Regeneration and Neighbourhood Department's budget that fall within its remit.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 At the meeting of the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee held on 19 October 2012 it was agreed that, as in previous years, consideration of the budget proposals would be split to enable each standing Scrutiny Forum to look in detail at the service areas that fall within their remit. Any comments / observations to then be fed back to the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee on the 7 December 2012, to enable a formal response to be presented to Cabinet on 17 December 2012.
- 2.2 As a starting point for the 2013/14 budget process, Cabinet on the 4 October 2012 considered a detailed report in relation to the development of the Council's Medium Term Financial Strategy (MTFS) for 2013/14 to 2016/17 and approved details of the consultation process and timetable for consideration of the Executives proposals. In addition to this, it was also brought to the Cabinet's attention that, over and above dealing with core budget issues, the Local Authority will also have to address:-
 - the impact of significant national changes in the funding system for local Authorities which the Government are introducing from April 2013, covering Council Tax Benefit Reform and the re-localisation of business

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rates. Furthermore, the Council needs to address financial risks arising from these changes.

- 2.3 Overview and Scrutiny involvement in the consultation process commenced at the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee meeting on the 19 October 2012, at which consideration was given to the report received by Cabinet on the 4 October 2012. The Committee looked in detail at the report and discussed at length the ongoing budget deficit, approving the submission of the initial proposals contained within the report to the relevant Standing Scrutiny Forums for further detailed consideration.
- 2.4 In accordance with the wishes of the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee, the Neighbourhood Services Scrutiny Forum is today being asked to look in detail at the initial proposals in relation to those service areas within the Regeneration and Neighbourhoods Department that fall within its remit. Details of these initial proposals are contained within the following appendices:-

Appendix A – Budget Pressures; and **Appendix B** – Saving Proposals.

- 2.5 Where individual budget items were identified to be considered as part of a Forums work programme, greater detail in relation to the proposed savings may have been presented at an earlier meeting of the Forum.
- 2.6 To assist Members of this Scrutiny Forum in the consideration of the initial proposals, arrangements have been made for the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services and the Assistant Director of Transportation and Engineering to be in attendance and an invitation to this meeting has also been extended to the relevant Portfolio Holder(s) (attendance subject to availability).

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 It is recommended that the Neighbourhood Services Scrutiny Forum: -
 - a) as part of the Budget and Policy Framework initial consultation proposals for 2013/2014, consider the pressures and saving proposals relating to the neighbourhood services areas of service provision within the Regeneration and Neighbourhoods Department; and
 - b) formulates any comments and observations in relation to each to be presented by the Chair of this Scrutiny Forum to the meeting of the Scrutiny Co-ordinating Committee to be held on 7 December 2012 to enable a formal response to be presented to the Cabinet on 17 December 2012.
