Subject: LOCAL TRANSPORT PLAN 2016/17 OUT-TURN

AND 2017/18 PROGRAMME

1. TYPE OF DECISION / APPLICABLE CATEGORY

1.1 Non-key decision.

2. PURPOSE OF REPORT

2.1 To inform the Neighbourhood Services Committee of the progress made under the Local Transport Plan delivery programme during 2016/17, and to identify potential schemes for 2017/18.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The third Local Transport Plan (LTP) 2011-2026, sets out how a safe and sustainable transport system can be delivered within Hartlepool. It was recognised that funding, particularly in the short to medium term, was significantly reduced from the second LTP period and, whilst this represented a significant barrier to delivering the Council's aspirations for improving the transport network in Hartlepool, it provided opportunities to work more closely with our partner organisations for the overall benefit of the town.
- 3.2 The strategy is not limited to the five year timescale of previous LTP's but is designed to look towards 2026 and evolve over this period. This extended timescale ensures that the LTP is aligned with regional strategies and local development frameworks. The strategy continues to be kept under review within this time period, to ensure that it remains current, responding to any changes in circumstances, and taking into account any revisions in guidance and best practice.
- 3.3 On 31st March 2015, the final year of the LTP Delivery Plan (2011-2015) was completed. A subsequent LTP Strategic Delivery Plan (2015-21), had

- already been approved at the Neighbourhood Services Committee meeting on16th March 2015, covering the 6 year period, (indicative allocations only, for the final 3 year periods) see **Appendix 1.**
- 3.4 Year 1 (2015-2016) of the Strategic Delivery Plan (2015-21), was completed on 31st March 2016, and Year 2 (2016-2017) on the 31st March 2017. We have now commenced with Year 3 (2017-2018) beginning on 1st April, 2017.

4. PROPOSALS

- 4.1 The Local Transport Plan funding has enabled the Council to undertake a significant number of projects in 2016/17 to help maintain and improve both our strategic and local road network. Some of the projects undertaken last year include:
 - Upgrading the signalised carriageway crossing, thereby creating access for cyclists, on the A689 Stockton Road carriageway;
 - The installation of missing, corroded and damaged bus stop poles, in preparation for the Tees Valley upgrade of all bus stop flags;
 - The installation of various traffic calming schemes across the Borough, which includes the installation of 20mph speed restriction signage, the commissioning of vehicle activated signage, etc;
 - The installation of speed cushions and bollard installations at Barnard Grove School;
 - Traffic signal upgrades to York Road / Park Road, Jesmond Road / Chester Road
 - The installation of new "Welcome To Hartlepool" signage across the strategic road network to help promote Hartlepool as a visitor choice of destination;
 - The reconstruction of the public footway at North Lane, Elwick Village;
 - Junction widening and associated footpath repairs and replacement to Longhill Industrial Estate; and
 - Carrying out necessary repairs and maintenance to Middlethorpe bridge.
- 4.3 **Appendix 2** details all of the works delivered during 2016/17, while it also includes the proposed schemes for 2017/18.
- 4.4 A number of Highway Maintenance schemes were also completed during 2016/17, and these are detailed in **Appendix 3.** Some of the areas to benefit include Mainsforth Terrace, Claremont Drive, Sea View Terrace and Torquay Avenue.

- 6.1 All works / schemes will be funded via the LTP allocation, from Central Government, as detailed in the Local Transport Delivery Plan (2015-2021), which was approved by the Neighbourhood Services Committee on 16th March 2015.
- For year 2017/2018 the allocation for highway maintenance from the Local Transport Plan is £1,053,000, and the five year programme has been prepared assuming a similar level being allocated year on year. There are also allocations of £99,000 from the Government's Pot-hole Fund, and £98,000 from the Incentive Fund, giving a total of £1,250,000. This was approved by the Neighbourhood Services Committee, at the meeting on 20th March. 2017.

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


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

Allotment Performance Review

Achievements

Stranton Relocation

During 2016 the first phase of a review into allotment provision within the town was undertaken and the second phase will be presented to committee when works are completed. A major piece of work undertaken over the last year has been the relocation of over 30 tenants from the Stranton allotment site due to the expansion of Stranton cemetery. This project involved extensive consultation with the affected tenants to establish their preferred site for relocation and to agree an acceptable level of assistance. The project is currently nearing completion with a deadline for final hand-over of the site of March 2018.

Improved Offer

The Allotment Service has also worked hard to improve the quality of the plots on offer, despite challenging financial circumstances. A special offer scheme was introduced in 2016 to make long-term vacant plots more attractive to potential new tenants. Under the scheme, the plots are offered on the basis that the new tenant will carry out the clearance of the plot in exchange for the provision of (for example) new fencing or additional skips. Those taking on a plot under the scheme are also granted an extended probation period. To date, 9 long-term vacant plots have been brought back into use through this scheme.

Occupancy Rate

Following work to identify problem plots and efforts to improve these and attract new tenants, there has been a slight increase in the occupancy rate for the allotment service (as shown in Table 1).

The drop in the occupancy rate shown in 2016 is due to plots being "held back" to provide alternative plots for the tenants being relocated from Stranton. Following the relocation of all but one of the affected tenants, the 52 plots on the cemetery site have now been removed from the total provision.

Security Improvements

Security has always been a significant issue with the allotments. During 2016, the Allotments Service worked closely with the Community Safety team and Thornhill Allotment Association to set up a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme for the site. Using the existing Association committee structure the group created their own Neighbourhood Watch Association. The group have since carried out several site security surveys and have installed signage and anti-climb paint provided by the allotments and community safety teams. A property marking session is planned with Cleveland Police to take place during summer 2017 and the Allotments Service is now looking to extend this project to other allotment sites.

Inspections


The annual allotment inspections have continued and the Service continues to use the "traffic light" grading system for assessing plots. The system of warning and advisory letters was tweaked slightly in 2015 so that all tenants graded "amber" would now receive an "advisory" letter rather than some receiving a warning and some not. The advisory letters are issued to identify issues before they escalate to official warning level and explain where improvements need to be made.

The format of the inspections was amended the following year (2016) so that appointments were made for those plots which cannot be seen from outside at the start of the inspections. This allowed for those tenants who missed the first round of appointments to be fitted in during the main inspections rather than being tagged on at the end in October when most plots are being wound down for the winter. This saved over a month off the inspection timetable and meant all plots could be inspected at the right time of year.

Allotment Performance Review

Achievements

The numbers of red, amber and green inspections are shown in Table 2. The table shows that the majority of plots are graded green for being in good condition. There was a slight drop in the number of amber and red plots in 2016, with a corresponding increase in green plots showing a slight overall improvement in plot condition.



Allotment Contacts

In January 2015, the Council's customer services team took over the initial point of contact for the allotments service, providing telephone response to the majority of calls and also a face-to-face service via the service desk in reception. This now allows for the number of such contacts to be recorded. Table 3 shows that from 2015 to 2016, the number of enquiries remained roughly the same (note that the low number of enquiries received for April-June 2015 was due to the installation of a new telephone system). The table also shows the peak times for both telephone and face-to-face enquiries are March/April to coincide with the annual invoices. A second peak occurs from August-October which coincides with the results of the annual inspections being sent out to tenants.
